However, it cannot be stressed enough, that a vehicle operated on the VCPS, must carry the VicRoads Permit (current), the AOMC VCPS Handbook and a copy of *Your ABCCC News* that contains details of the event the permitted vehicle is participating in. All enquiries should be addressed to the VCPS Officers.

No matter, the information is there for us to note carefully. The letter relates to the Victorian Club Permit Scheme Review which has been undertaken by VicRoads with input from the AOMC, the Federation and interested clubs. So, at last, the Review has been approved by the Minister and VicRoads have been charged with introducing the new Scheme in February, 2011.

It is good to note that a couple of changes put forward by clubs were taken on board. We will be able to drive our permitted vehicles a distance of 100 metres from the vehicle's home address without requiring a logbook entry. This will make shuffling cars much easier when, for example, parking one in the street outside, while another vehicle is being taken out of the garage and along the driveway. Further information in a separate article.

Rob and Mary Nolan have provided a lovely piece about their travels in Bolivia and Peru. This is the sort of thing we need. Hopefully, we will get a good story about the Ghan Rail trip. Such items add to the interest level of our magazine.

Don't forget to make your bookings for the Christmas Lunch Run. Be sure to shop early for our Christmas Kringle gift scheme that is a great part of our event. There is a booking form on the last page.

THE VICTORIAN CLUB PERMIT SCHEME REVIEW

A copy of the a letter from the Minister for Roads and Ports, Tim Pallas, is reproduced on page 6. The heritage vehicle movement has endorsed the proposed 90-day Logbook Scheme, and this aspect has now been taken on board by VicRoads and approved by the Minister. Details about how the new system will actually be implemented will be issued by the AOMC and the Federation. Expect some guidance on this after February 2011.

We have scored a small win in that a VCPS operated vehicle can be driven without a logbook entry, so that multiple vehicles can be easily shuffled for access purposes. The new ruling states that such a vehicle can be driven within a 100 metre radius from the vehicle's home address.

VicRoads originally proposed a thirty-year cut off for vehicles eligible for VCPS. This raised some concerns among the groups. It is pleasing to note that VicRoads have reverted to the original 25-year cut off.

In addition to the foregoing, the regulations will allow VicRoads to provide information to assist clubs in administering the VCPS and to apply sanctions against individuals or clubs for misuse of vehicles, number plates or logbooks. We hope that clubs will be assisted by the authorities when such misuse and abuse of the VCPS occurs.

It should be remembered that, if a vehicle on Club Permit plates is stopped by police, and if the logbook has not been completed for the trip, the driver/owner will face the consequences of driving an unregistered vehicle, and the standard fine will apply. It is to be hoped that a club will be notified about repeat offenders before any sanctions are made against the offender's club. This is an important aspect, because with the logbook scheme, clubs will have no knowledge of how and when members' vehicles are being used.

Hopefully the coming version of the VCPS will be of a great success, and it will be introduced on schedule.

REVISED CLUB PERMIT SCHEME

You will recall that in November 2009, VicRoads released a discussion paper titled "Proposal for Revision of the Victorian Club Permit Scheme" for community and stakeholder comment. The paper elicited a broad range of comments which VicRoads has taken on board. An overwhelming majority of submissions were in favour of the proposed changes.

As a result | have approved a number of changes including the introduction of logbooks to record the use of club vehicles. Other changes are:

- Vehicles will be allowed to be driven within a radius of 100 metres from the vehicle home address without the need for a logbook entry to be completed.
- The current 25 year eligibility for entry to the Club Permit Scheme will be retained.
- The regulations will allow VicRoads to provide information to assist clubs in administering the permit scheme and to apply sanctions against individuals or clubs for misuse of vehicles, number plates or logbooks.

These changes will provide significant benefits to permit holders by increasing the flexibility of use of club vehicles, remove the uncertainties about the legality of using club vehicles on the road and enforcement improvement.

I have asked VicRoads to proceed with the drafting of regulations which will allow the revised scheme to be implemented as soon as possible.

It is expected that the changes will be implemented from February 2011.

You will be kept informed of progress relating to the implementation of these important changes to the scheme.

Another Well-earned Induction!

Editor's Note: Eunice Matthews, an enthusiastic member of the Hastings Start Committee for the RACV Great Australian Rally, has been inducted into the Variety Children's Charity Hall of Fame. Eunice is one of those who considers nothing impossible. It is through Eunice that we put on a breakfast for participants who start from the Westernport Marina car park. Congratulations Eunice!



Eunice Matthews has followed a long and winding road to the Variety Children's Charity Hall of Fame. In fact, it has been a succession of winding roads as she took part in thirteen Variety 'bashes' to raise money for disabled and disadvantaged children. Her decision to help raise money for children came from her awareness of the plight of ill children and the sadness it can cause.

In 1964 Eunice's son Wayne died 21 months after being born with severe epilepsy. Now 74, Eunice remembers the long days and nights spent in hospitals with Wayne and the eventual hopelessness of the doctors' fight to prolong and enhance his life. Her induction to Variety's Hall of Fame came as a complete surprise to Eunice, who was ill with the flu and had decided against attending the End-of-Bash Dinner at Margaret River on Friday 20th August.

"I wasn't there, so I still don't know what was said or why I was inducted", Eunice said back in Hastings.

Affectionately known as 'Mum', Eunice this year was navigator for Mornington's John Crossin in the nine-day bash that ran 5,004 kilometres from Ballarat to Margaret River in Western Australia. Usually part of the *Babe Mobile Team*, along with Jill Lewis and Gayle Shute, Eunice this year volunteered to join John Crossin when his partner John Mackie had to drop out at the last minute.

"It was full on rain and mud", Eunice said. Crossin's Ford LTD (once used by Prime Minister Malcolm Fraser), made the journey unscathed, but the HR Wagon *Babe Mobile* was not so lucky. It skidded into a post at the side of the road rolling into a ditch. "They were near Streaky Bay, and, luckily, they landed on all four wheels and were alright." Eunice said.

For Eunice and Crossin, one of the most cherished memories from the latest Bash was seeing eight adult whales and at least two calves in the area which was once the home of whales near Eucla, South Australia.

The ninety-eight entrants in this year's Bash raised \$1.3-million for Variety, bringing the grand total to more than \$13.8-million. Eunice says that when it is time for next year's Bash, her 14th and Variety's 21st, she will be back aboard for a trek across Tasmania.

THE AUTOMOTIVE LIGHT EMITTING DIODE (LED)

Or, The Illuminating March Of Progress

Light emitting diode (LED) type lighting has been used in the automotive industry for some time. It has been used for such illuminating tasks or signifying that an alarm system is set. A little red blinking lamp placed in a visible position informs and deters car thieves. Increasingly, LEDs have been used in other aspects of the motoring scene. This is particularly so with the advent of very bright LEDs. It is good to see that VicRoads is also in on this little lighting revolution. We have all benefitted from those flashing speed-limit notification signs at the ends of school zones, along with the signs out on the highways that inform us of the danger of excessive speed for the road conditions ahead. For quite some time, I thought that their message was flashed as you approached no matter what speed the car was travelling at. It was on the highway to Ballarat, before the bends approaching Bacchus Marsh, that, over several trips at increasingly slower speeds, I discovered that, at just below 60 kph, the warning message did not flash as I approached. This is a little bit strange, because just beyond this warning message, there is a yellow speed advisory sign that advises 80 kph for the bend! Therefore, all motorists who slow to at least the advisory speed, are informed that they are driving too fast. This anomaly does not really matter, because a new section of freeway is being built to the south that should not have the requirement for a speed-related flashing warning.

For those of us who are getting a bit older, the new traffic lights that are being installed progressively throughout our State are a real godsend. They are so much easier to see as they are approached from a distance, that they must be making our intersections safer. We should be very grateful for this technology. This form of technology is becoming increasingly common in modern motor cars, and it is for our benefit, too. LEDs are a type of light that is not greatly affected by rough road conditions and inclement weather. Increasingly, trailer lights have swung over to the use of bright LEDs. Does this swing assume that all vehicles are now wired negative to earth? This is cause for concern, because a large number of British classic cars were wired positive to earth in the interests of more durable ignition systems. Whereas a filament globe (bulb) will work with current passing through it in either direction, an LED will only let the current illuminate it from one direction. That is what diodes have been developed for in the first place – to prevent reverse current flow in electrical systems.

There is a great benefit to motorists where LEDs are employed, particularly with respect to brake lights. A brake light that is made up from a cluster of LEDs will be inherently brighter (of higher intensity) and, best of all,

will reach full intensity quicker than an incandescent light globe. This means that the following motorist will take notice of LED type brake lights quicker than those with filament type globes.

Some Interesting Points

High intensity LED brake lights do have major advantages. When compared with incandescent globes, their faster illumination time gives following motorists significantly reduced stopping distances. Incandescent lamps used for automotive lighting have turn-on times in the range 100 - 300 milliseconds (i.e. up to one-third of a second). In comparison, a LED lamp has a turn-on time of 100 nanoseconds – pretty well instant! A nanosecond is one billionth of a second (10^{-9} s) or, in layman's language, one nanosecond is to one second, as one second is to 31.7 years. Some would say, a very short space of time.

Those turn-on times assume that full battery voltage is available, but voltage drops are often present in brake lights. If subjected to reduced voltage at the lamp, turn-on times for incandescent lamps are even longer. With a voltage drop of 4-volts, the turn-on time of an incandescent automotive globe can be as much as double. The brightness of brake lights is also greatly reduced if the lamp is subjected to this lower than design-level voltage.

Studies have indicated that LED rear brake lights provide a braking response time advantage of between 170 and 200 milliseconds under favourable road conditions, and up to 300 milliseconds under adverse conditions. A 200 millisecond improvement in braking response is equivalent to a reduction in the stopping distance of 5.8 metres at a speed of 105 kph.

In addition, practical testing has indicated that the response time of a person viewing a LED brake light is actually faster than would be expected, even taking into account the shorter LED switch-on time. It's thought that a lamp that reaches full brilliance very quickly is more likely to catch the eye of the following driver than one that reaches full brightness only slowly. Typical current consumption for an interior LED type light is just 0.05 amp. Such current consumption means that vehicles can be parked with parking lamps illuminated at night, with little battery drain.

But, There Is More . . .

There are many types of LED lights available for cars. These are known as automotive LED lights and come as headlights, taillights and interior lighting. This technology enables the lights to consume much less power and operate longer than ordinary halogen globes or incandescent light globes. Furthermore, these small lights do not heat up quickly because most of the energy consumed by them is converted into light.

Interior car LED lights can be used to light up the interior of a motor car. These lights also provide security to some extent. LED type lights for cars come in a variety of types, shapes and sizes to fulfil different requirements. They are mostly used by car lovers to enhance the appearance of their vehicle. These lights can also serve the purpose of security as they are bright and can be recognized from a distance. Automotive lights are available as dash indicators, LED dome lights, turn signal LEDs, brake lights, taillights and many others.
