The Victorian Club Permit Scheme

The ABCCC Inc. is a club that is authorised by VicRoads to operate vehicles under the Victorian Club Permit Scheme (VCPS). On the Committee there are two VCPS Officers and their contact details are listed above.

Club members will be kept up to date with respect to changes and improvements to the VCPS. However, it cannot be stressed enough, that a vehicle operated on the VCPS, must carry the VicRoads Logbook and Permit (current), the AOMC VCPS Handbook and a copy of *Your ABCCC News* that contains details of the event the permitted vehicle is participating in. All enquiries should be addressed to the VCPS Officers.

THE VICTORIAN CLUB PERMIT SCHEME

NEW PERMIT APPLICATIONS

For members wanting to operate a motor car on the Victorian Club Permit Scheme (VCPS) under the auspices of our club, please contact Nello Mafodda on (03) 9719 7949, who is the ABCCC VCPS Officer In Charge. Nello will be able to provide all the information required to operate a motor car on the VCPS. Nello's position is entirely voluntary, so due consideration should be given when contacting him.

The ABCCC has the following conditions for operating a motor vehicle [twenty-five (25) years old and older] on the Victorian Club Permit Scheme:

- 1. Initial contact should be made with the club's VCPS Applications Officer, currently Nello Mafodda. He will advise the procedure for application with respect to the conditions set by the ABCCC.
- 2. A club member who proposes to place his/her motor vehicle on the VCPS under the auspices of the ABCCC must have been a ABCCC member for more than one year.
- 3. A Roadworthy Certificate must accompany an application for the Victorian Club Permit Scheme under the auspices of the ABCCC.
- 4. A club member who operates a motor vehicle on the Victorian Club Permit Scheme, under the auspices of the ABCCC, must attend a minimum of three (3) club events per year. The car does not have to attend three events, just the owner. Excluded from the count are the Annual Winter Luncheon and the Christmas Luncheon events.
- 5. VicRoads requires a permit holder to be in good financial status in order to drive the car under this Permit.
- 6. The ABCCC will notify VicRoads when a permit holder becomes an unfinancial member.
- 7. The ABCCC will maintain a Register of those Motor Vehicles operated on the Victorian Club Permit Scheme under the club's conditions. Such Register will be submitted to VicRoads upon request.
- 8. The motor vehicle operated under the Permit Scheme should be used within the spirit of the motor vehicle club scheme.

PERMIT RENEWALS

VicRoads requires that an ABCCC authorised VCPS Officer's signature is entered on the permit renewal notice. Therefore, your VCPS renewal should be sent to Colin Brown, PO Box 40, Coldstream, Victoria 3770. Enclose with it a stamped envelope addressed to VicRoads, along with a cheque/money order for the VCPS fee. Colin will sign on behalf of the ABCCC, and then forward the permit renewal on to VicRoads. The form also requires YOUR signature, so be sure to sign it as the permit holder as well.

Colin's position is entirely voluntary, so due consideration should be given when contacting him.

The RACV Fly The Flag Tour has been recommended many times and this year I was able to convince Liz to come along for the ride. We were both very glad we did. This week long rally was expertly organised and marshalled by the All British Classics Car Club, and had some 205 vehicles with over 400 passengers. No mean feat to manage such a large tour.

The tour started with breakfast in Keilor followed by an easy run to Warrnambool via Barwon Park Manor for the first of all our catered meals. This set the scene for lots of eating and nattering, over the whole week. Day Two saw a local self-guided tour of the district including the Great Ocean Road, and dairy district concluding with a gourmet BBQ at the Maritime Village. There we were also privileged to witness the firing of a very large and loud 19th century cannon.

Day Three saw the tour amble to Mt. Gambier via Port Fairy, Portland and the odd volcano. Again punctuated with coffee stops, more eating and nattering. Mt Gambier saw plenty of dancing at the evening meal followed the next day with another ambling drive thru the area. We caused traffic chaos in sleepy Penola. A ROAD TEST REPORT SERVICE FOR YOUR BRITISH CLASSIC

Editor's Note: The following service offer arrived via E-mail. The ABCCC does not endorse the services offered. The original was not too well assembled and all reference to foreign motor cars has been deleted. The ABCCC also makes no claims about the accuracy of car model names and/or numbers. As has been said – buyer take care!

As owners and restorers of classic cars we all appreciate the importance of correct detail about our vehicles. Original road tests, photos, specifications and design drawings are invaluable to the classic car owner. With this in mind, I wish to make your club members, (and perhaps your club librarian), aware of the huge range of original road tests that I have available which may feature their cars.

These are not photocopies or reprints, but are original magazines from the UK, USA and Australia (dating back to 1945). All contain road tests and features on the various models. Prices vary depending on age, but average between \$10 – \$15 per magazine. This a small price to pay for a magazine that sometimes contains pre-release tests of the some model of cars (perhaps even in the same colour), of the car you now own. If you have the car, you need these to go with it.

Postage costs are reasonable, and can be reduced even further by combining orders within your club. I have included a list of the road tests and features that are available.

An e-mail to me at dksk_03@yahoo.com.au indicating vehicle type, model and year is all that is required.

You will receive a return e-mail telling which magazines, (plus month and year of printing) that are available along with prices delivered to your door.

AOMC NEWS

Winter Seminar for Car Clubs – Saturday 4th August 2012

This very popular event has been put together for us by the AOMC. The theme this time around is Vehicle Restoration with speakers from the restoration and restoration supplies industries. The AOMC needs to know numbers so, if you wish to attend, please Ross Gardiner or Bill Allen know before 17th July 2012.

AOMC Delegate's Meeting Report – 21st May 2012

Meeting opened by President Iain Ross (*Bristol Car Club*) sharp on 7:30 pm. With the reminder that the new postal address for the AOMC is now: Chevrolet Clubrooms, AOMC, 1/3 Edgecombe Court, Moorabbin, 3189. Delegates were asked to notify their Club to amend their records.

The usual opening procedures of welcoming all, especially those who had come great distances; new Delegates and visitors; confirming minutes of the February meeting were dealt with. Then Standing Orders were suspended to introduce the guest speaker.

Roy Francis from Prostate Cancer Foundation spoke about Men's Health in general, but mainly on prostate cancer. Roy stated that the idea that men die with prostate cancer rather than from it, is a myth. Now there are far more men dying from prostate cancer. Roy explained that our fathers' life expectancy was 50 to 60, but now we live to be 80 and beyond. Therefore, as prostate cancer is so common in men, it is now a leading cause of death.

The main theme of the talk was to encourage men to visit their doctor regularly. Not put it off until it becomes too late for medical intervention having a chance to prolong lives. Mr Francis suggested that having regular tests such as PSA levels is one way the doctor determine if you are at an increased chance of developing cancer. In which case some remedial action can be taken. Roy stated that an enlarged prostate can often be detected early, if we are seeing our doctor regularly, so that something can be done before it develops into a full blown cancer. Roy stressed the responsibility of the ladies encouraging their men to not neglect those regular visits. Diet may be an important means of controlling the condition. Details of diet can be found on the www.prostate.org.au.

Mr Francis is available to speak at a club meeting, free of charge. Please call 1800 220 099. Roy was thanked for his very useful talk, and we all went off for a supper break, and natter.

Standing Orders were resumed with President Iain Ross urging Delegates to seriously considering offering themselves for the AOMC Committee at the AGM in November. This was supported by committee member Dennis Brooks (*Historic Commercial Vehicle Club*), who has been compiling the AOMC Calendar.

Treasurer David Williamson (*Rover Car Club*), reported that the finances are healthy, with a good response from both the American Motoring Show and the British & European (RACV Classic Showcase). David explained that it cost the AOMC nearly \$40,000 to put these two shows on at Flemington in April this year, but that there were 1,157 American cars, with 1,338 visitors. The figures for the RACV Classic Showcase (British and European Show) this year were 1,182 cars with 1,241 visitors. It was pleasing to see the numbers of cars and visitors up on previous years.

President Ross gave a report on the four shows put on by the AOMC this year. He was happy with the greater support from the British and European Clubs this year. President Ross suggested that there was a need to rethink the Japanese Show with plans for consultation with Toyota being in progress. Iain also reported that a sizable donation went to the local SES as a result of their manning the gate at Yarra Glen again this year. Victorian Club Permit Scheme (VCPS) report – Vice President Rod Amos, (*Vintage Sports Car Club*), reported that the AOMC was looking for suggestions on permit windscreen labels to assist VicRoads, which intend to add information about the cars. Delegates suggested that open cars have trouble with them getting wet; some of the earlier cars had small windscreens, etc. While agreeing with more information, we would like smaller labels to reduce a serious blind-spot. The Delegate from the *Veteran Car Club* reported that one of their members had solved the problem by placing the sticker on the inside of the near-side headlamp glass. Rod said VicRoads had reported there were now about 12,000 vehicles on the VCPS.

VicRoads is concerned, as are many clubs, with the emerging of seriously modified vehicles. They are looking at ways to control this, as well as, the developing guidelines on roadworthy testing on historic vehicles. Street Rod Regulations not been developed.

The AOMC is looking to produce a 'Code of Practice' for clubs with VCPS owners as non-financial members and late payment of Permit. It appears that some clubs are very strict in reporting non-financial members to VicRoads, while others are much more lenient. Late VCPS renewal can result in unregistered vehicle penalties.

Several Delegates reported that it was almost impossible to get a reply to correspondence with VicRoads, There are errors in the VicRoads computer system not showing that last year's permit had been paid. NOTE: It was advised to take your Log Book with you, when renewing, as the receipt is pasted to the inside cover.

Engine Number Records – Philip Johnstone (*Triumph Sports Owners Association*) asked if there were any questions, and as there was no response, Philip then moved on to the AOMC Winter Seminar. This year the topic will be Restoration Techniques. Some of the suggestions from the floor were – chrome plating, bead and sand blasting, powder coating, brakes, lost wax casting, seat springs and instruments. More details are to be sent out to all clubs when speakers are confirmed.

AOMC Calendar of Events – Dennis Brooks, (*Historic Commercial Vehicle Club*). Dennis reminded Delegates that items for inclusion in the *AOMC Newsletter* Calendar of Events need to be for events well ahead, as the *Newsletter* only comes out quarterly.

Club Reports

- Veteran Car Club Delegate reported on the re-enactment of the 28-day crossing in 1912 from Freemantle to Sydney in a Brush. This event was for 1 and 2 cylinder vehicles up to 1918. 33 cars and motor cycles started on 16th March and finished on the 29th. While there were many problems solved along the way, it was a great event.
- 2. The Austin Healey Sprite Club had an event in Wangaratta recently, at which they had set up a video link direct to Stirling Moss.
- 3. Military vehicles run at Bairnsdale in November.
- 4. The VDC Delegate reported that they had again conducted their Concurs at the Yarra Glen RACV Cavalcade Of Transport (Heritage Motoring Day). It was won again this year, by Noel Keogh with his 1929 Hupmobile.
- 5. The Alvis Club Delegate reported on their recent tour in Tasmania.
- The delegate from the Dandenong Valley Club reported that they had combined with many of the Mornington Peninsula Clubs and staged their own Heritage Day at the Kooringal Shopping Centre at Frankston. They had 160 vehicles attend.
- 7. Patrick Devine (*Mercedes-Benz Club*) reported on a recent Mercedes-Benz Club run to South Australia using the Great Ocean Road. Patrick said around 80 cars took part.
- 8. Graham Hutchinson (CHACA) reported that this year CHACA had combined their 46th Birthday Run with the RACV Cavalcade Of Transport at Yarra Glen. He joined with many others in congratulating lain Ross and the AOMC Committee/Volunteers for a great day. Graham also mentioned that it has become policy at CHACA to fine any of their members who inadvertently refer to club vehicles by the terrible 'old cars' terminology. They are to henceforth be known as 'Historic Vehicles'.
- 9. A Delegate from one of the Morris Clubs reported that 2013 was to be the centenary of Morris, and that they were planning for the coming year.
- 11. One of the Delegates reported on a recent TV programme about Sir Jack Brabham. (ABC Australian Story)

BOOK REVIEW – CLASSIC BRITISH CARS

A Retrospective View of the British Automobile Industry

This coffee table book by lan Ward was published in 2010 by The Abbeydale Press, and was produced for Anness Publishing. The book is of a fairly large format and features fine, clear photographs of well-preserved British Classics. For some of us, there are a number of glaring omissions from the rich variety of British marques and models.

The text is informative, but not too technical. It features ghost portions of photographs that have been overprinted and are thus quite difficult to read. It is also disappointing that there is not a chapter that describes the overall scene of the British motor car industry as promised by the cover's sub heading.

Classic British Cars, originally priced at \$49.00, can now be picked up for \$20.00 at book sales. That represents good value, because the overall quality of the book is good – the binding is sound and the paper is of particularly good type for printing and for subsequent handling. It is just unfortunate that some text is not too easy to read and, to some of us, important British margues are missing.

The acknowledgements feature quite a number of specialist car clubs from all over Britain indicates that the author has contacted the proper sources for information on the makes and models he has selected.

At times, while reading this book, I was under the impression that it was aimed towards North American readers.

Healey BN1 was among the 220 veteran, vintage, classic and modern-classic vehicles (more than 25 years old) that


