AN INTERESTING OUTING - Sunday, 1st October 2017


Another great day was organised by Christopher and Geraldine Constantine. Indeed it was a 'flight of fancy' in one respect - read on. We met at the Melbourne Zoo with 14 cars. I wonder if someone was a victim of the change to daylight saving. We set off on an interesting route towards Williamstown. We had a brief stop at the historic bluestone tower - the Williamstown Timeball Tower on Battery Rd. Our member, David Cook knew all about it as he was involved in the restoration of the tower back in the late 90s as part of a Lions Club project. The tower was converted from a lighthouse back to the original configuration which was a ball on a mast. On the dot of 12 noon the ball would drop from the top from its raised position on the post down to the bottom so that all the ships at sea and various places on land could tell and set their clocks at 12 noon.

We continued on around the esplanade and enjoyed coffee at the kiosk which lived up to its good reputation. Most of us don't get to see this side of Melbourne frequently so it was most enjoyable to view this area on such a beautiful day. The Esplanade Altona is a little known gem, although if you're intending to buy on the esplanade cheaply you're too late. We continued on via back roads and found ourselves driving through the new suburbs of Point Cook. This

suburb has rolled out like a gigantic carpet. We were relieved we were not trying to get in or out of Pt Cook in peak hour. You need to seriously avoid this we are told. All of a sudden we were at the RAAF base and presenting our driver's licence to allow entry. Curiously the guard only wanted the driver's identity, but I wouldn't bank on it next time!

For those interested in aviation, me very much included, the RAAF museum at Point Cook is a real gem. There are hangers full of aircraft beautifully displayed and restored to the highest standard. There are wonderful displays of aviation memorabilia and also heart-wrenching letters written home by pilots during the war. One of these letters in particular was written by a young pilot who didn't expect to



come home. He wrote the letter to his mother on condition that she receives it if he were killed in battle, which he was. He bore no grudges and fulfilled his duty proudly. You could not listen to this letter being read and have a dry eye at its conclusion.

Many of the museum's aircraft are airworthy and regularly fly. In fact today we were able to view a Winjeel performing aerobatics. This aircraft had been built during the 50s at Commonwealth Aircraft Corporation in Fisherman's Bend only a matter of a few kilometres away. This was real history. What made it even better was the


organised question and answer session that followed with the

AOMC NEWS DELEGATES' MEETING – 26th August 2017

The Delegates Meeting was held at the Darnum Memorial Hall, Darnum. It was hosted by the Trafalgar Truck Restorers' Club whose Members also provided the excellent lunch and afternoon tea. Keith Mortimer AOMC President introduced the Guest Speakers - John Lewis and Drew (?) from Vicroads and Andrew George, CEO, Society of Automotive Engineers.

John Lewis stated that Vicroads had engaged consultants to review the whole CPS Scheme. They had found that there needed to be a boost in confidence in the Scheme and assurance that it met with expectations of all interested parties. It was vital that clubs play a major part in running the scheme into the future. The "Old Car" movement, in general, provided a significant and important role in providing financial and other support to local communities and in aiding the mental health aspect of those participating in the Movement. The consultants found that these aspects helped to "sell" the Scheme and they provided a positive benefit to the community.

Vicroads have been looking into the logistics of moving the current CPS Database onto the Main Computer Database. Until recently the cost of this had been estimated in the millions; far to much to justify it. However, they are now looking at a much cheaper version which may prove feasible. Should this change occur renewals will be easier and more reliable, police will be happier as it will be easier for them to operate and normal number plates could be used obviating the need for the current "H", "M" and "SR" plates. The Logbook system would, of course, continue as at present.

The problems currently being experienced with Deceased Estates should be resolved when new procedures are introduced in September 2017. The same rules will apply to the CPS Scheme as those that apply to full registrations. Transfer is only permitted to the remaining/surviving spouse. It is not and will not include children or anybody else. Transfer to anybody other than the spouse will involve obtaining a RWC as required when purchasing a vehicle. These rules will be included on the Vicroads website and an extra section will be included especially for the CPS Scheme.

Andrew George gave a slide presentation of the various requirements when modifications are made to a vehicle. These requirements can be very comprehensive and involved, depending on the particular modification and the vehicle in question. Full details are available from the Society's website. They are happy to answer questions over the telephone. Andrew also warned against purchasing imported modified parts from some retail outlets as they may well not be up to Australian Standards and quite often when one part is changed other parts can be affected and require changing, too.

There was then an opportunity for Delegates to ask the Guest Speakers questions.

The problem with deceased estates was again raised and John Lewis stated that the problems should be resolved whenr the new rules for the CPS Scheme were introduced from the 11th September. The horror stories previously experienced should then be a thing of the past.

Questions were asked about importing and/or exporting cars containing asbestos. It is thought that greater emphasis regarding asbestos has been created by recent problems with Great Wall and other Chinese vehicle. Customs have been troubled with incorrect information supplied to them and look at each situation on a case by case basis.

There had been problems with safety glass in windscreens and in some cases such windscreens had been rejected by RWC inspectors. This problem was caused by the Inspector's lack of knowledge. Vicroads would be happy to assist if contacted.

There were questions regarding Logbook entries when a journey continued past midnight. As every day must be accounted for, it is necessary to make a new entry as soon as possible after midnight. It is thought that police would be understanding should one being pulled up just after midnight before the new entry had been made in the Log Book. Planning for such a contingency would probably be a good idea.

Questions were raised about the size of "SR" (Street Rod) plates. These plated were currently too large to be fitted to some Hot Rod vehicles. Vicroads do not have any ordering systems allowing change to "H", "M" or "SR" plates and accordingly no alternative sized plates are available and Vicroads are unlikely to change this arrangement. The proposal to have Slimline plates available has still not been resolved.

Some Delegates did not like the owner's address being printed on the CPS receipt and asked why this was necessary as crooks could find out the owner's address if were left in the vehicle. It was suggested that logbooks or anything else of value should either be removed from or securely locked up in the vehicle when unattended.

About changes to the review of the CPS Scheme. Change of regulations are not likely within the next 12 months as a total review of the system is carried out every ten years. This review last took place in 2009. So the next one will be in 2019. Vicroads need to prove to the Government the value of the Scheme to the community.

John Lewis believes that clubs will always be involved with the Scheme and that participants will continue to be required to be a member of a Vicroads Authorised Club.

Vicroads will continue to honour previously approved modifications provided no further modifications have been made since approval. This pleased members of the truck clubs as most trucks have been modified during their working life.

A question was asked about changing vehicles currently on "H" plates to "M" plates. Vicroads are happy to assist with this and further details on this matter are likely to be forthcoming shortly. It was emphasised that "M" plates were not inferior in any way to "H" plates. Apparently some Delegates were under the impression that they were for some strange reason.

At the close of the Meeting the Trafalgar Truck Restorers' Club were thanked for their hospitality and the beautiful food. John Fowler, President of the Hall Committee was thanked for the use of the excellent venue.
