CLUB PERMIT SCHEME

ABCCC is a VicRoads authorised Club to participate in the VicRoads Club Permit Scheme (CPS)

The ABCCC has set rules & conditions for operating a motor vehicle [twenty-five (25) years old and older on the CPS, for further information about how the CPS is conducted by the All British Classics Car Club please visit the club's Website Link ABCCC Club Permit Scheme information All the information is available online.

- 1. **Initial contact** should be made with the club's Vehicle Logbook Club Permit Scheme (VLCPS) Applications Officer, currently Wally Thompson. He will advise the procedure for application with respect to the conditions set by the ABCCC. He must also provide a first inspection of the vehicle.
- 2. **PERMIT RENEWALS** VicRoads requires that an ABCCC authorised VLCPS Officer's signature is entered on the permit renewal notice. Therefore, your VLCPS renewal should be sent to Colin Brown, PO Box 40, Coldstream, Victoria 3770. Enclose with it a stamped envelope addressed to VicRoads, along with a cheque/money order for the VLCPS fee. Colin will sign on behalf of the ABCCC, and then forward the permit renewal on to VicRoads. The form also requires YOUR signature, so be sure to sign it as the permit holder as well.

Both Wally & Colin's position are entirely voluntary, so due consideration should be given when contacting them.






NOTE: the proposed route includes approx 500metres of 2nd class road.

At Queenscliff Fort







Fort Queenscliff, in Victoria, Australia, dates from 1860 when an open battery was constructed on Shortland's Bluff to defend the entrance to Port Phillip Bay. The Fort, which underwent major redevelopment in the late 1870s and 1880s, became the headquarters for an extensive chain of forts around Port Phillip Heads. Its garrison included volunteer artillery, engineers, infantry and naval militia, and it was manned as a coastal defence installation continuously from 1883 to 1946. The other fortifications and armaments around the Heads were completed by 1891, and together made Port Phillip one of the most heavily defended harbours in the British Empire. (extract from the History of Fort Queenscliff)

Brian spoke about The Heads and The Rip, so we all went down to see if we could catch a ship or too! The views were spectacular. We weren't disappointed!





Yes later that evening we were lucky enough to see the Virgin Cruise Ship Resilient Lady heading to Burnie Extracted this information from the web: The 110,000 gross tonnage (gt) Resilient Lady cruise ship can accommodate 2,770 passengers and 1,160 crew members. It has an overall length of 278m, a width of 38m, and 17 decks. The cruising speed of the ship is 20 knots, with a maximum speed of 22 knots.

Inside we all climbed the spiral staircase - 125 steps, they are pretty confined and when returning in some places you need to come down backwards. Secret is not to look down! Once you get to the top, the views are spectacular.

Well worth it and well done to everyone!

The Lighthouse celebrated its centenary in 2002. Point Lonsdale Lighthouse looks over the narrow entrance to Port Phillip Bay, The Rip as its is known, is one of the most notorious entrances to any bay in the world.

As shipping increased with the development of Melbourne in early 1800's the need for guidance to mariners was recognised.

Point Lonsdale received a private signal station in 1851 consisting of a pole mounted oil lamp on top of a sand dune to help ships negotiate its dangerous waters.

Four years later, a red pillar beacon was built to warn of



22 metre concrete tower is 2 metres thick at the bottom tapering to 1 metre thick at the top.

In 1928 a foghorn was constructed in a shed below the lighthouse to warn of the approach in times of fog.

In 1915 the lighthouse was passed from the Victorian State Government to Commonwealth control with the formation of the Commonwealth lighthouse service. it was handed back to the State of Victoria in 1934 and classified as a harbour entrance light rather than a 'Coastal Highway Light'.

1934 also saw the light converted from Kerosene to electric illumination, now of course the modern LED lights have replaced the old electric illumination, lasting longer.

The light was automated in 1999, the signal station continues to be staffed and controls the movements of commercial shipping within designated areas both outside and inside Port Phillip Heads, making it possibly the last staffed lighthouse in Australia.

NEWS FROM THE FEDERATION

REPORT ON THE FEDERATION DELEGATES MEETING HELD ON 10th FEBRUARY 2024.



The above Meeting was hosted by the Maryborough District Historic Vehicle Club and was held at the nearby Carisbrook Senior Citizens Centre. Our Club was represented by Delegate Bill Allen.

Following a photo shoot of the Delegates by the local Maryborough Newspaper the Meeting was opened at 1.00pm by Federation President, Neil Athorn who welcomed Delegates and Visitors and thanked the Club for providing such an excellent lunch and invited all to afternoon tea following the Meeting. He then introduced the Club President, Russell, to give a brief overview of the Club.

After a round of applause Russell gave a rundown of the Club. The Club was formed in 1989 and has around 120 Members with approximately 30 being active. It will be holding its 35th Anniversary at the next Meeting and it is expected that a larger than usual number of Members will attend. The Club has a diverse range of vehicles, with a couple being over 100 years old. Maryborough is a great place to live and currently its population is expanding.

Neil then advised Delegates that Delegate from the Hamilton Club, Doug Palmer had passed away in December 2023 and invited Hamilton's other Delegate, Graham Ralph to give a eulogy on Doug's behalf.

Graham reported that Doug had experienced many health problems in recent years and had spent his last three months in hospital. He was a Foundation and Life Member of the Hamilton Club which was founded in 1970. His contribution to the Club was enormous and he was instrumental in attracting many Members to the Club. He also organised many of the Annual Queen's (now King's) Birthday Events. Doug had also been a Delegate for the Federation for many years.

He will be very sadly missed.

Following Graham's Eulogy a Minutes Silence was held.

Neil then advised this was the first Meeting of the year and that any Member of a Club can represent the Club at Meetings. He called for any additional apologies and advised the 51st Begonia Festival will be held at Ballarat next week. The Humber Club applied to rejoin the Federation after a lapse of some years. As their Application was accepted the Humber Club was welcomed back. They initially joined the Federation in 1996.

Treasurer, Brett Holloway gave a detailed report on the Federation's financial position. As many Member Clubs had already renewed their subscriptions and that \$10,000.00, loaned to the Bendigo Swap, had been repaid, the Federation finances were in a healthy position, especially for this time of year. Cheque for last November's Swap is yet to be received.

Several Grant Applications have been received. The Mildura Club has requested a Grant for Computer to centralise their records, they have also purchased a printer. The Antique Motorcycle Club have requested a Grant for a Defibrillator which they hope they will never need to use and the Early Ford V8 Club have requested \$1,000.00 for a portable Public Address system plus a request for a trophy. All applications were approved and passed for payment.

Neil presented his President's Report. Events included for 2024 include Mortlake Picnic on 24th March 2024. This event will be bigger than ever with the Moyne Council providing a \$3,000.00 Grant. The Wunghnu Picnic will be held on 30th-31st March 2024. There will be sheep dog trials, tractor displays and tractor pulls. The Scoresby Picnic will be held on 5th May 2024 at the Scoresby Steam Park Centre, with all parts of the Park open. The Murrabit Picnic will be held on the 19th May 2024, the National Motoring Heritage day and the day after the Kerang Delegates Meeting. The Baw Baw Picnic is proceeding satisfactorily and will be held on 20th October 2024, the day after the Delegates Meeting.

The Golden Oldies currently has 45 entrants with a capacity of 60, so there is still space for more to join the event. Entry forms can be found on the Federation website.

Peter Mac tins have to date raised more than \$6000.00.

Neil then spoke about the Bendigo Swap Meeting, held last November 2023. He advised the large sheds in the Showgrounds were again taken over by the Government in January 2024 due to floods once again. It appears that construction of the large building for the now cancelled Commonwealth Games is not proceeding. There may not be a Show and Shine next year. The behavior at Meeting was not too bad. However the ladies shower facilities experienced blocked drains which caused a lot of problems and, to date, have not been rectified.

It was very disappointing that around 80 Stallholders failed to attend. It appears a lot of dispatched mail was ignored by recipients. The Ballarat Swap Meeting has been cancelled due to lack of venue.

There are arguments about supplying drinking water, which apparently need to have Security twenty four hours. This has still not been resolved. It was suggested that a free bottle of water be given to each entrant upon arrival, however refilling the bottle would be a problem. It was also suggested that sunscreen should be supplied as well!

There was then a discussion about supplying a Card Reader for entrants who did not have or wish to pay cash. The cash versus card argument continued with each Card Reader costing about \$140.00. This matter also to be resolved. Handicapped Parking is currently provided. Some problems were encountered with phone system, also not resolved.

Neil is keen to reduce his involvement with the Swap Meeting, which is owned by the Federation and run by the Bendigo Club, and concentrate on the Federation, so far he has not had a lot of success in this regard.

David Berner spoke briefly about the AHMF and their desire share an alliance with a number of similar organizations in an endeavor to gain more knowledge. The National Heavy Vehicle Regulator is causing some difficulties regarding the carriage of Petrochemicals. David is also requested further input for their Magazine. The question was raised are cars unroadworthy or are roads unroadworthy food for thought. South Australia is considering allowing replicas to go on their CPS, currently Victoria is the only State allowing this. Website is running well.

Joint Meetings with the AOMC are going well. Joint approach to VicRoads regarding numerous matters including ownership of early Vic number plates is progressing. It is hoped to organise a joint vehicle display, possibly at Werribee Park in a couple of years. Hopefully after roadworks in that area have been finalised. Both organisations jointly hope to assist non Member Clubs. Further discussions covering conditions certain vehicles such as tractors to be discussed with VicRoads. The CPS Handbook, previously arranged by the AOMC, is being revised and will be available to both organisations. No outcome as yet from VicRoads regarding LPG Vehicles. There are reports that some CPS Renewals are being sent out without the appropriate Log Book.

Review on Taxation implications of Clubs has been requested but not resolved as yet. The situation is still being discussed with the ATO, who have provided a form which is not very clear. A Public Relations Pack is being prepared but not yet released. Brett H is still working on it and advised that there are over 200,000 not for profit organisations currently. He also recommended that if your Club does not have an ABN - DON'T GET ONE!

There was some discussion on attracting younger people to our hobby. One delegate advised some children, under suitable supervision, had restored a tractor which is now located at the Lake Goldsmith Steam Centre.

Graham Ralph advised that Hamilton King's Birthday event will be held once more on the weekend of the 8th to 10th June 2024. Further details will be a available shortly.

The best car at the Meeting was awarded to Max Hobson for his 1938 Ford V8 Roadster complete with period Teardrop caravan. Max spoke about his car about his car and caravan. He stated that he can't restore cars and bought these two example from deceased estates and only did a bit of tidying up.

LEFT TURN

Arm and hand extending left, palm facing down



RIGHT TURN

Arm out bent at 90° angle up with fist clinched



STOP

Arm out bent at 90° angle down with palm facing back



SLOW DOWN

Arm extended straight out with palm facing down while swinging arm down



SPEED UP

Arm extended straight out with palm facing up while swinging arm upward



HAZARD IN ROAD

On left point with left hand

On right point with right foot



FOLLOW ME

Arm extended straight up with palm facing forward



TAKE THE LEAD

Arm extended index finger pointing out while swinging arc from bact to front



PULL OFF

Arm extended index finger pointing out while swinging arc from left to over head



SINGLE FILE

Arm straight up with index finger pointed up



DOUBLE FILE

Arm straight up with index finger and middle finger up



RIDE STAGGERED

Arm straight up with index finger and pinky up



FUEL STOP

Point to fuel tank



COMFORT STOP

Arm extended with clinched fist with short up and down motion



REFRESHMENT STOP

Fingers closed with thumb to mouth



TURN SIGNAL ON

Extend arm while opening and closing hand



POLICE AHEAD

Tap top of head or helmet with palm of hand
