### **CLUB PERMIT SCHEME**

ABCCC is a VicRoads authorised Club to participate in the VicRoads Club Permit Scheme (CPS)

The ABCCC has set rules & conditions for operating a motor vehicle [twenty-five (25) years old and older on the CPS, for further information about how the CPS is conducted by the All British Classics Car Club please visit the club's Website Link <u>ABCCC Club Permit Scheme information</u> All the information is available online.

- 1. **Initial contact** should be made with the club's Vehicle Logbook Club Permit Scheme (VLCPS) Applications Officer, currently Wally Thompson. He will advise the procedure for application with respect to the conditions set by the ABCCC. He must also provide a first inspection of the vehicle.
- 2. **PERMIT RENEWALS** VicRoads requires that an ABCCC authorised VLCPS Officer's signature is entered on the permit renewal notice. Therefore, your VLCPS renewal should be sent to Colin Brown, PO Box 40, Coldstream, Victoria 3770. Enclose with it a stamped envelope addressed to VicRoads, along with a cheque/money order for the VLCPS fee. Colin will sign on behalf of the ABCCC and then forward the permit renewal on to VicRoads. The form also requires YOUR signature, so be sure to sign it as the permit holder as well.

Both Wally & Colin's position are entirely voluntary, so due consideration should be given when contacting them.

### Minutes of the AOMC May Delegates Meeting

Monday May 19, 2025, at 7.45 pm. Venue: Penrites Lane 88 Auto Museum.

There were 69 attendees representing 58 clubs and 1 visitor (Guest Speaker). Chair: Iain Ross, Vice President AOMC, welcomed delegates and guests and thanked Penrite for allowing us to use their premises and making us welcome.

**Guest Speaker:** Brendan Hughes (National Technical and Training Manager Penrite Oils) Brendan started with a background on Penrite. It is a family-owned Australian business since 1926, turning 100 next year. Penrite services Australia, New Zealand, the Asia/Pacific region, the UK, Europe and USA. As well as engine oils Penrite produces coolants, additives, gear oils, greases, etc.

Company started in 1926 by Les Mecoles who was only 16 at the time and started by blending oils on his mother's stove in St Kilda. First deliveries were done by wheelbarrow. The name Penrite was thought up by Les, as he used Pennsylvania Crude and rite was Les' way of saying 'buy the right oil'. In 1979 the company was purchased by John & Margaret Dymond. John came from the UK where he was an auto engineer for Vauxhall and came to Australia for BP in the mid 60's to help develop lubricants for the Australia Pacific region.

The premises we are in at present (Lane 88) used to be the blending plant and part of the administration and several adjoining factories were also part of the business. They are now based in Dandenong. Brendan then played a short video showcasing the new manufacturing premises at Dandenong. Where we are today was turned into the Lane 88 Museum.

Penrite run their own historic racing team and also have Penrite racing in the V8 supercars and support motorcycle racing as well. They have 250 brand ambassadors around the country.

Brendan then talked about oils. Base oils are what comes out of the ground. The oil is put through a refining process and ends up in 5 different groups. Groups 1,2 & 3 come from crude oil, whilst groups 4 & 5 come from man-made product.

What goes into an oil? A normal engine oil has about 75% base oil and the rest is additive. One additive is detergent, which is used to keep the engine clean. They also have dispersants, which attract the impurities in your engine. This is what causes oils to go dark after a while. When you change your oil, it takes out all the impurities with it. There were many other additives that he mentioned, each with a particular task.

**Different Oil Types.** Oils for cars need to be by specification, not viscosity. Viscosity is how thick the fluid is. The higher the number (ie 0W, 5W, 20W) the lower the temperature at which the oil will still pour. The second number is the Operating temperature viscosity of the oil, and it states 100 degrees. The higher the number here means a higher filler strength (W30, W40, W50). Standards for oils are set by industry bodies such as API (American) and ACEA (European).

**Have oils improved over the years?** Looking at an oil from 2004 compared to one from 2021, there is about a 20% improvement in wear protection, 30% better sludge protection, less thickening, better soot control, and in the later ones even better fuel economy.

**Can you use newer oils in older cars?** Some are designed for use in older cars and some are not. Engine tolerances are different. Older cars oil levels were measured by dip stick; newer cars are measured in microns.

How do you find the right oil for your car? Penrite have an app on their webpage that can be used to help you select the right oil. You can check via rego number, dating back to 1900.

**Questions from the floor:** What is the best oil to use when you only start your engine every two weeks or a month at a time.? The best oil is the one that is specified for that engine. Penrite's specialty oils for older cars have a tacky additive so they stick to the engine wall. That way, when you do start your car, you don't start it dry. What about veteran vehicles that have brass wheel bearings and chain drive that need specific lubricants? Penrite have a range of products in the classic range specifically for such needs. What is the difference between Shelsey oils and Classic oils in the range? Shelsey oils are designed for 1920s to 1940s era cars with low detergent additives. Classic oils are for post war classics with oil filters.

**Treasurer's Report:** Mark Fenton reported that AOMC has \$283,552 in bank accounts as of April 30, 2025. Slightly inflated figure as some expensed to be paid out for events. Significant loss incurred from the American Motoring Show, so this is being reviewed. AOMC has therefore not raised the budgeted revenue from events this year, but however have been able to complete a \$12,000 donation to RedKite Charity being the money raised from this year's Festival of Motoring. Clubs are reminded that AOMC currently has \$6,500 in bank accounts that is held on behalf of the RACV which is for small club grants for small clubs without an ABN. Process for applying can be done through the AOMC website. Tax return for 2023/24 has been completed with no tax payable, and BAS reporting is up to date. Invoices have been sent out to all clubs for 2025/26 membership and are due on July 1st. They have been issued earlier this year due to the introduction of the MembershipPLUS program for insurance. Overall, the AOMC is in a strong financial position and is able to fund the launch of MembershipPLUS and any other programs identified in our strategic plans.

**VicRoads CPS Report:** Tony Hall (AOMC Secretary) reported that tomorrow night AOMC & VicFed are having a meeting with VicRoads. This is a working group that was formed as the authorities concerned all preferred a one voice

approach, so AOMC & VicFed formed a subgroup to be that one voice. Has worked effectively over time. VicRoads is now 81% owned by a private consortium, which has raised a few issues. Meeting tomorrow is with John Lewis and several other members of his team. There is interesting news expected, but VicRoads have not clarified what it is. One thing we are trying to achieve is to improve communication, such as a request / complaint from a club that has trouble getting through to someone at VicRoads, so we are establishing a point of elevation that will be very closely held to get quicker responses. **AOMC Events 2025:** Club & Trade Expo Saturday October 18th. Last year we had inaugural showcase at Shannons, with about 25 traders and 15 car clubs displaying. Was a bit of a challenge organising with only a few months to do. This evolved from the restoration seminars that the AOMC put on annually and was closed to club members only. The idea of expanding the seminar to a showcase was to open the event up to give clubs additional exposure and give the trades that support our movement exposure to our market. We have been talking with Penrite and have some very good discussions with them on how to take this format to another level, and it will be held at their plant in Dandenong on the 18th of October. We are still looking for trade's presenters, so clubs are asked to encourage trades they know could benefit to get involved. It will also be open to the general public. Iain Ross noted that Ariel batteries are now closing down as they cannot source the components they need anymore.

**AOMC Events 2026** Festival of Motoring at Cruden farm. January 16. British & European Show - Sunday February 15 at Yarra Glen Racecourse. Aussie Classic Car Show - Sunday March 29th at Manhattan NMHD - Sunday May 17 American Motoring Show - A meeting will be held in the next few weeks with representatives invited from all the American clubs to discuss the future of this event.

**MembershipPLUS Club Insurance Scheme**: Mark Fenton reported that MembershipPLUS affiliation scheme is up and running. Several seminars have been held with executives from clubs invited. 135 attendees representing 85 clubs over the 2 seminars. We have been putting out emails to keep clubs informed and the website has been updated with recordings of the seminar and the slide packs that were presented at the seminar. A handbook has been produced explaining all aspects of the scheme. It is just not insurance where you pay and do nothing else. The reason this scheme is significantly cheaper than other products is that the program is about reducing the risk of what the clubs are doing. Mark encouraged delegates and clubs to read up on all the information we have put out. The time lines are that the scheme will start from July 1st, 2025. This is the date the policy will be in place and clubs can join the policy. Clubs can apply earlier, and some have already. Do not be put off by the fact you have to do a bit of work, the savings to your club are well worth the effort. AOMC do not expect it all to be done by day one, this is a journey, and we will help clubs in developing their Risk management Plans over the next 12 months.

**Club Taxation Responsibilities:** Mark Fenton reported that 12 months ago at the Club Management Seminar, we had as a presenter the Assistant Commissioner for tax for not-for-profit organisations. That was to alert clubs that the tax office was making some changes to the way reporting has to occur. It didn't change the fact that not for profits still have to consider whether they need to pay tax, they are not automatically exempt which is an argument that has been going on for the last 12 months. Clubs have taken this information on board and realise that they do have a tax reporting obligation, or they do not earn enough income to pay tax, but we still have to inform the ATO. That process was going to roll out from July 1st last year. Deadlines are now that clubs that believe they have an exemption need to put in a return at end of March 2025, but reality is most of our clubs are not exempt, so they need to put in a tax return of some sort even if no tax is payable. Somebody has to put in that return, and it is up to clubs to arrange. If clubs haven't put in a return, they will start to hear from the ATO. Tony Hall added that we have had some enquiries from clubs about who AOMC would recommend for accounting advice, and we have an arrangement that if clubs approach Tony, he can put your club in contact with an accountant who is right across this topic who can give you some direction.

**Support Grants:** Mark Fenton reported that we have been looking for a way to support apprentices and businesses in trades that support our movement. Today we have launched support grants to facilitate this. The information is on the AOMC website. Two types of Grants available. Criteria for eligibility is on the AOMC website. Apprentice Support Grant. 4 x \$500 grants available for an apprentice to apply for. Business Support Grant: 3 x \$1,000 grants available for equipment or training. Both these are relatively small at this stage, but we are just starting off and will see where we go.

**Engine Number Records:** Philip Johnstone reported that during the normal course of weekly operations we get queries from Victorian and interstate people regarding the history of their vehicle. Some of these are trivial and may require the identification of vehicles from a photograph for family history. Some turn into a full search of the vehicle registration records. Over the past few months over 20 searches have gone through. 7 GT Falcons, a couple of Model T Fords, an International truck, a Benz and also a Mercedes Benz, Sunbeam Alpine, MG TC, Fiat 1100, Land Rover, Chrysler, Plymouth, Buick, plus the usual range of Holdens and Torana's. At the end of this year, Philip is retiring from the Engine Number Records which means any searches will be hard to produce unless someone takes over from him. So, anyone who has an interest flowing through on engine number records and history, see Phillip, Keith or someone on committee to register your interest.
