The Victorian Club Permit Scheme

The ABCCC Inc. is a club that is authorised by VicRoads to operate vehicles under the Victorian Club Permit Scheme (VCPS). On the Committee there are two VCPS Officers and their contact details are listed above.

Club members will be kept up to date with respect to changes and improvements to the VCPS. However, it cannot be stressed enough, that a vehicle operated on the VCPS, must carry the VicRoads Logbook and Permit (current) and proof that the permit holder has a current membership in the auspicious club (e.g., your ABCCC membership card). All enquiries should be addressed to the VCPS Officers.

THE VICTORIAN CLUB PERMIT SCHEME

NEW PERMIT APPLICATIONS

For members wanting to operate a motor car on the Victorian Club Permit Scheme (VCPS) under the auspices of our club, please contact Nello Mafodda on (03) 9719 7949, who is the ABCCC VCPS Officer In Charge. Nello will be able to provide all the information required to operate a motor car on the VCPS. Nello's position is entirely voluntary, so due consideration should be given when contacting him.

The ABCCC has the following conditions for operating a motor vehicle [twenty-five (25) years old and older] on the Victorian Club Permit Scheme:

- 1. Initial contact should be made with the club's VCPS Applications Officer, currently Nello Mafodda. He will advise the procedure for application with respect to the conditions set by the ABCCC.
- 2. A club member who proposes to place his/her motor vehicle on the VCPS under the auspices of the ABCCC must have been a ABCCC member for more than one year.
- 3. A Roadworthy Certificate must accompany an application for the Victorian Club Permit Scheme under the auspices of the ABCCC.
- 4. A club member who operates a motor vehicle on the Victorian Club Permit Scheme, under the auspices of the ABCCC, must attend a minimum of three (3) club events per year. The car does not have to attend three events, just the owner. Excluded from the count are the Annual Winter Luncheon and the Christmas Luncheon events.
- 5. VicRoads requires a permit holder to be in good financial status in order to drive the car under this Permit.
- 6. The ABCCC will notify VicRoads when a permit holder becomes an unfinancial member.
- 7. The ABCCC will maintain a Register of those Motor Vehicles operated on the Victorian Club Permit Scheme under the club's conditions. Such Register will be submitted to VicRoads upon request.
- 8. The motor vehicle operated under the Permit Scheme should be used within the spirit of the motor vehicle club scheme.

PERMIT RENEWALS

VicRoads requires that an ABCCC authorised VCPS Officer's signature is entered on the permit renewal notice. Therefore, your VCPS renewal should be sent to Colin Brown, PO Box 40, Coldstream, Victoria 3770. Enclose with it a stamped envelope addressed to VicRoads, along with a cheque/money order for the VCPS fee. Colin will sign on behalf of the ABCCC, and then forward the permit renewal on to VicRoads. The form also requires YOUR signature, so be sure to sign it as the permit holder as well.

Colin's position is entirely voluntary, so due consideration should be given when contacting him.



PREPARING FOR THE RACV FLY THE FLAG TOUR – 2013

A Breakdown-free Tour – Hopefully


After the acute embarrassment of having *Pea Soup* flat-topped home from Mount Gambier because of a seized front wheel bearing during last year's Tour, this time around steps were taken well in advance for ensuring a reliable Tour. *Pea Soup* was booked in for a service. This escalated to a major repair as well as the service.

Increasingly, the left hand side rear wheel bearing noise had become intrusive and something had to be done. A set of wheel bearings and special collapsible spacers were ordered. The kits soon arrived and the job was scheduled to be carried out during the main service. Graham Ratcliff motors in Ringwood discovered an interesting situation. A small amount of grease was found in both hubs, however, on both sides of the car, lubricating grease was found to be virtually non-existent at the outer bearings. In fact, the outer bearing on the car's left hand side, was found to have just the merest trace of grease and had, as a result, severely pitted rollers and outer race – hence the noise inside the car. The inner bearings on both sides, were found to be in reasonable condition for their reputed age of thirty-seven vears.

This condition was interesting. Had the hub bearings lasted thirty-seven years with just the small amount of grease being present? Or, had the hub bearings been serviced at some stage and the applied grease migrated to the inner bearing at each side of the motor car? A quick word with Tom Cannon revealed that, during the car's re-build, the rear wheel bearings had not been a part of the job.

For the time being, these questions are a bit academic. Longer life for the rear hubs has been assured by the provision of a grease fitting in each hub. From now on, a regime has been introduced whereby each hub receives two good strokes from the grease gun, every twelve months, just to ensure



peace of mind. Since last year's fiasco in Mount Gambier, all four hubs now feature grease fittings! This latest episode reveals how important it is for us to apply grease, regularly, at the hub bearings on our classic motor cars.

The rear end of the car is now remarkably quiet, however, the staff did detect some noise coming from the bearing at the front of the rear axle pinion extension housing. Research, since that report, has found that none of the doyens of Rover servicing contacted on the subject, have ever heard of this bearing being replaced. The oil seal, yes, that has been a reasonably common culprit for oil leaks, but the bearing – no. The research into this is ongoing.

This saga should serve as a reminder for all of us to check our cars' wheel bearings, periodically – all four of them.

Pea Soup was as ready for this year's RACV Fly the Flag Tour as it could be – new front wheel bearings, new radiator hoses, new drive belts, fresh lubricants right through, carburettors adjusted and those new rear hub bearings installed, we were ready for a reliable Tour.

That was until, on a pleasant sunny afternoon when I decided to do some driveway pruning in the garden and then quickly mulch the cut branches to tidy up. All of this went well, until the electric mulcher required moving. While resetting it into place, a 'right old twinge' was felt in the lower back and hip area. That was it! The discomfort was such that our entry in the Tour had to be cancelled. It has also meant that this magazine will be a little bit late.




