

EVENTS' REPORTS

WHAT WE HAVE BEEN DOING

VISIT AND TOUR OF OVERNEWTON CASTLE – Wednesday 8th October, 2014

At one point, things were looking a bit desperate as to whether we would have enough starters to make this a viable event. Lynn Higginson had put in considerable effort to ensure that we would have an interesting day out. The cause was also assisted by our Webmaster sending out a request for larger numbers of participants, thanks are due to Ed for that, because the numbers increased dramatically - to the extent that we filled the large dining room for lunch, with rather minimal elbow room. We were collected by Tony and Maxine at a reasonable hour for the drive to Keilor. The car's vocal navigation system had trouble pronouncing the word 'Lilydale' apparently, but managed to guide us to our destination. That was confirmed when we spotted Bill and Terri Allen's red Rover - from that point it was a simple case of 'Follow that car!' After parking and greeting folk, we adjourned to the dining room for morning tea with scones, jam and cream. While were emptying our cups, one of our guides told us about the history of Overnewton Castle. Once we were all assembled outside, Gordon Lindner took some group photographs to commemorate the event. Herewith follows a brief history of Overnewton Castle which has been borrowed from the Internet. Our thanks for use of it here. Overnewton castle was built by William Taylor in 1849. The Scotsman bought 13,000 acres (5,261 ha) of rich grazing land just west of the Keilor township. Taylor built a simple single story bluestone colonial style homestead. This consisted of six (6) rooms with large shuttered windows and wide verandas. The homestead was positioned on a gentle slope overlooking Keilor and afforded extensive views of the surrounding countryside.During the 1850's Keilor became an important and busy stopover for travellers on their way to the Victorian Goldfields. This included the building of two schools, a new bridge and a new hotel. It was not until William Taylor returned from a trip to Scotland in 1859 that the grandeur of his dreams became apparent. He set about turning the original colonial homestead into a miniature Scottish baronial castle. The stately two-story wing was added, along with the blue stone dairy and butcher's shop and the private billiard room, now used as a chapel for wedding ceremonies. Overnewton is built in the Victorian Tudor style, inspired by 16th century English and Scottish architecture. The Scottish baronial style is characterised by its rough textured masonry, steeply pitched rooves and overhanging battlement corner turrets. The candle-snuffer rooves show the influence of the French architecture. The bluestone walls were quarried on the estate and rendered with a yellow gravel and stucco finish. Above the large windows of the master bedroom is the Taylor family crest – a mailed arm and fist enclosing a dagger and the motto 'Semper Fidelis' (Always Faithful) and, above several other windows are the carved initials of HT, T 1859 and WT.After the completion of this wing the homestead consisted of over thirty-five rooms including seven bedrooms (the master bedroom room included a small circular room and a dressing room), schoolroom, library, drawing room, two kitchens, five servants' rooms and the billiards room. There are still many original features such as tiles in the bathrooms, a claw-foot bath and the original IXL wood stove in the kitchen. Several out-buildings on the estate include a bluestone butchery and dairy, lamp-room, boot-room, coachhouse, stables, woolshed, shearing sheds and a machinery shed. William Taylor passed away in 1903, aged eightyfive and, six months later, his wife Helen aged seventy-one passed away. Their eldest son William Henry continued to manage the estate, until he passed away in 1939 aged eighty-one. The estate remain in the Taylor family until 1959. The Carr family purchased Overnewton in 1959, where they raised their three children on the property using part of it as a family home. The downstairs rooms were put to use as a wedding reception centre. In 1975 Dr. LJ Norton purchased Overnewton Estate and raised his own family on the property. Since then there have been many upgrades and changes to the property including mains water in 1976. A fire in 1980, burnt the old timber stables. Dr Norton purchased back six acres of land which included a dry stone wall and some of the original outbuildings. The years have been kind to Overnewton, today it remains much the same as when it was originally built. Hidden away amongst some magnificent old trees, it has seen many changes throughout the years. Gone are the days of horses and carriages, gas lighting and servants. However, the old-world grace and charm along with the elegance, grandeur and atmosphere of a bygone era still remain. Having been restored over the years and an elegant dining room added to the estate this is definitely a hidden treasure. (From the Overnewton Website)A highlight of the house tour, for me, was to spot a lithograph print of IK Brunel's SS Great Britain pictured in mountainous seas. It is indeed comforting to know that this pioneering ship is now being restored, in Bristol, in the same dry dock that she was built in. After our tour of the house and its gardens it was time for lunch. We enjoyed a good traditional roast with roasted and steamed vegetables. On each table there were bowls of tempting salad and then we finished with desserts and coffee. After saying our thanks and goodbyes, we set off for home. On our way to the main road, we spotted birthday boy, Colin Forrest, heading from the roundabout, that we went straight ahead at, into the local school's driveway. Our collective thanks are due to Lynn for her superb organisation of the visit for our enjoyment. Special thanks are due to Tony and Maxine for driving us there and home again. It was a most interesting and enjoyable day out, our own thanks for having us along.
