A group of those not wishing to shiver any more, climbed into the Daimler brought by Gordon and Elaine Lindner. The wind was quite lazy – it went through us, rather than swerve around us

AOMC NEWS

AOMC Winter Seminar 2017 [Restoration Services]

This seminar was held Saturday morning 22 July at the Jaguar Owners Club/Austin Healy Club. The venue was spacious and well equipped. What follows is a brief review by one attendee.

The seminar was advertised as 8.30 am for 9.00 am; however the program available on the day listed an Introduction by the president at 8.35 and the first speaker at 8.45 am. Then it was discovered that the first speaker was not there.

The seminar got under way with Pete's Prestige Windscreens addressing windscreen repair and replacement. The former range of rubber is now limited so products like silicon are used for holding glass in a frame but a neutral cure type must be used.

The next was from Metalock Australia. There was a problem getting the images shown. When they finally appeared you could have mistaken them for Rorschach test images.

Wiring Looms, located in Ringwood, followed and we saw a video of how the cotton covering of the wires is done with special machines. They have patterns for the looms of many makes. I got the impression that that they cannot produce a loom from a wiring diagram and hence cannot do custom jobs. Examples of some looms were available for viewing.

Classic and European Trim Supplies was next. Supplies is the name and that is their game.

A break followed that was well catered.

Performance Exhaust - who used to be in Ringwood and soon to be in Knoxfield, were on next. We heard about stainless steel systems and problems with mufflers sold as stainless steel units that had mild steel baffles that rust out. We also heard how the fibreglass can progressively be blown out the exhaust pipe. The helpers did not hold the samples high enough to be seen beyond the front row.

Then one of the AOMC committee took a microphone around the trade displays. Unfortunately while he held the mike correctly for himself he held it too far away from the stall holders.

We then had a display of headlight globe types from Brown and Watson [Narva]. These were 7 inch lamps but they do not have anything for 8 inch or 9 inch headlights. An LED headlight globe requires a heat sink which is an aspect that may not be widely known. We did not get anything about the use of LEDs for turn signals which may have been more relevant to us.

We then heard a history of Crankshaft Rebuilders which did not convey anything about what services they could provide.

A 1934 Austin Ten with a new wooden utility body frame had been brought into the hall and the person who had made the frame spoke next. The type of glue used raised a question, but mostly it was a history of his work with car bodies.

We then heard from Head Stud Developments. This was another company history although Yella Terra [sp?] heads were mentioned. I do not know how many of the audience would know what they were.

The presentations were concluded with R.K. Restorations who - despite the name, was concerned with panel repair and paint.

Trade exhibitors who did not give a presentation were -

- 123 Ignition Systems who are agents for electronic distributors from the Netherlands.
- Nu-Tech can rejuvenate tie rod ends, etc. with a polymer bushing system

General comments -

- 1. Audio- visual aids were not used by all presenters and those who did use them needed help with preparation
- 2. No mention of indicative costs.
- 3. Services than can be provided and samples of work done may have been more useful [a trade exhibit].
- 4. Trying to get away from the venue afterwards was difficult due to it being next to the Springvale shopping area.
