AOMC REPORT

There were 105 delegates in attendance, representing 84 clubs at the May, 2018 Delegates' Meeting.

Presidents Report: Keith Mortimer reported that American Motoring Day at Yarra Glen was affected by wet weather, with some 200 cars attending on the day. Those which attended enjoyed the day and Keith thanked those individuals and clubs for supporting the event.

The AOMC National Motoring Heritage Day event was held at Kilmore Racecourse this year with over 100 vehicles attending, and great coverage was given by the local media. Keith acknowledged the Kilmore Racing Club for making the venue available and also Colin Jenkins, Graeme Moody, Philip Johnstone, and especially Howard Billing for running the event.

The committee is looking at structuring the calendar for next year and is asking for assistance in the running of all events. Keith noted that lain Ross has organised and run over 40 events for the AOMC over the years. Iain received a warm round of applause from the delegates.

Treasurers Report: Current cash balance is \$170,000. Renewal notices for 2018/19 memberships will be sent out soon. Fees will have a small increase as per last year's AGM resolution.

ANZAC Day: Daryl Meek (RACV) took the floor to talk about the 2018 ANZAC Day parade in the city. Daryl noted that the RACV, AOMC and Vic Fed have been in the firing line for the non participation of historic and military vehicles this year. RACV does not run the day; they only administer it for the RSL. The RSL make the decisions. This year, at very short notice, they decided to not allow vehicles older than 10 years to participate. This also included the many historic ex-military vehicles that normally participate. Daryl suggested that rather than browbeating the RACV and AOMC, clubs and individuals, they should work in conjunction with them in making representations to the RSL. Daryl then took questions from the floor.

Q: Did the direction come from the Premier's Department? No, the decision was made at RSL.

- Bevan Fenner (Vic Military Vehicles) noted that vehicles which normally took part in the Melbourne city march were reassigned to suburban and regional areas where they were gratefully accepted.

- Rick Cove (Khaki Vehicle Enthusiasts) has provided vehicles for 30 years at Bairnsdale, and the VMVA has provided vehicles for over 50 years. They were only told 10 days before the event that they would not be able to participate.

{Ed Note: Veteran groups were told in early March that historic vehicles would not be participating as police checks were being required of drivers by the security authorities. The RACV was able to comply with that requirement and given the task. Comments should be addressed to the ANZAC Day Commemoration Council, co-located at the Victorian RSL headquarters - Ed Bartosh}

VicRoads/VCPS: Iain Ross reported that VicRoads have been sending out surveys on the VCPS to vehicle owners, with the AOMC knew nothing about the survey or what was in it.

Several delegates reported on issues with VicRoads over renewals. Daryl Meek (RACV) reported that he has spoken to a VicRoads manager who is frustrated with the data system. VCPS is separate from the main database and needs a double entry to note the payment of renewals. He suggested stapling your current receipt in your logbook as proof of payment for the previous year.

Keith Mortimer encouraged all Delegates to remind their club members to treat VicRoads staff respectfully, as usually problems are due to incorrect information and an imperfect system.

Restoration Seminar: Saturday July 21st at Jaguar/Healey rooms. Graeme Moody and Colin Jenkins are organising this event, and they gave a brief outline of what they have in place so far. Information will be sent out early in June with a list of presenters. Bookings will be required as there will be a space limitation. A Morning Tea and a BBQ Lunch and morning tea will be provided. Graeme asked for any suggestions on possible presenters.

Club Management Seminar: Saturday August 11th. Presenter will be Steve Bowman. This event is aimed at club managers (President, Secretary, and Treasurer).

Luxury Car Tax: Iain Ross reported that the Federal government has decided not to repeal this tax at this stage. They have agreed for it not to be levied on cars exported solely for the purpose of restoration and then imported back into the country post restoration. This will apply from January 1st. 2019.

John Johnston (VDC) then took the floor to speak on the topic of multiple peak bodies in some states. He feels the problem is that there is no effective co-ordination between state bodies and between states on important topics. He pointed out the recent the Luxury Car Tax issue as one that had conflicting responses from several bodies. John believes that the two bodies in Victoria - AOMC and the Victorian Federation, serve the same membership but in different ways that are beneficial to their members. The trouble is when there is an issue that affects everyone. John suggested that in those instances, the two bodies need to have a Memorandum of Understanding for one consistent concise approach to these issues.

VACC: Iain Ross reported that this year is the 100th year of the VACC. To celebrate they are holding a rally from Melbourne to Bendigo and are looking to have one vehicle representing each of the past 100 years (1918 to 2018). Iain is looking for vehicles from the early 1920s and also from the 40s and 50s. He asked clubs for assistance in sourcing vehicles for those years.

Guest Speaker: Rick Blackburn, Men's Shed Association. Rick spoke on the formation of the Men's Shed movement and how it has grown to now have 350 sheds in Victoria with over 15,000 members. He noted that its success is due to it not being an organisation directed from the top down, but rather it is directed by the members themselves. Every shed is different; as it is made up of individuals that devise their own aims. None of the sheds are funded, as all funds are raised by the members. Some state funding has been provided for building and renovation.

General Business: Graeme Moody (Wangaratta VVCVC) reported that his club has recently donated \$1,000 to Wangaratta TAFE to provide tools for apprentices.

IT'S TIME THE AUTO WORLD TOOK A NOSTALGIC TRIP

For better or worse, I am part of the generation that sent vinyl record sales soaring to new heights last year, and whose hunger for all things analogue prompted Polaroid to bring back its one-step camera and

instant film. This is a strange phenomenon. Our nostalgia is entirely invented. Maybe it can all be traced back to a handful of Instagram influencers, or maybe it's caused by genuine interest in old technology.

Either way, it's time this analogue nostalgia trip struck the automotive world. Bringing back the Mini and the Fiat 500 was a good start, but the main thing they have in common with their ancestors is their names. The original 500 was a rear-engine thing of beauty, albeit a dreadfully slow one, and the new Mini is no longer mini at all.

There are so many other discarded automotive inventions ripe for comeback: bench seats, whitewall tyres, the pillar-less coupé, huge tailfins, etc. Peak-fin was in vogue in the late 1950s when Cadillac had towering tails reaching nearly up to the roof. The 1959 Chevrolet Impala's trunk had wildly



curvaceous sheet metal leading into horizontal fins which stretched the width of the car. Some fins incorporated brake lights; others were shod with chrome. They were dangerously pointy. Such exuberant design was a by-product of economic prosperity. The front bench seat still exists on many full-size utes. Why not put it back in sedans, convertibles and station-wagons, too? You get an extra seat and a bed in a pinch.

Elon Musk tried to give the jump seat a comeback. For an extra \$5,300 you can have your Model S sedan fitted with two rear-facing seats in the back. Both come with racing-style five-point safety harnesses. Jump seats were once common in station wagons. Old Volvos the V70R, for example, could be ordered with flip-up jump seats in the trunk. Similarly, old SUVs such as the Land Rover Defender and Toyota FJ40 had side-facing troop seats in the cargo area. Nothing better to make the daily trip to school feel like a safari.

The inside of today's Ford Focus looks inspired by some alien craft. What happened to the clean, simple dashboards of older cars? Belying its messy name, the cabin of the 1967 Alfa Romeo Giulia 1750 GT Veloce was minimalist perfection: a horizontal strip of leather atop a horizontal strip of wood, interrupted only by two round instrument dials and a steering wheel. There may have been a heater and radio in there somewhere, too. What more do you need? The dials them-selves were a minor work of industrial art so much so they've inspired an entire line of wristwatches by Autodromo.

Because modern cars are so packed with features and adjustable settings, minimal design is probably impossible. So, go the other way. Bring back real buttons. Give us a centre console that looks like a stack of vintage McIntosh amplifiers, with dials and buttons galore. The Lamborghini Miura or Lancia Delta Integrale are fine examples. Either one would be a welcome departure from modern touchscreen controls.

Entire genres of automobile have disappeared over time. Some are certainly ripe for a nostalgic comeback à la Polaroid. It would be lovely to see 'shooting brakes' return to showrooms. Modern examples of these two-door station wagons exist, but they are exotic treats. The lovely Ferrari GTC4 Lusso springs to mind, as does the new limited-edition Aston Martin Vanquish Zagato Shooting Brake.

Older, more affordable models such as the Volvo P1800 ES, could use a remake. Pillarless coupés faced a similar extinction. They're defined by their lack of B-pillar, which makes for an open, breezy driving experience. Classic examples include the late-eighties' Mercedes-Benz C124, the Jaguar XJ-C, BMW 8 Series, Bentley Brooklands Coupé and countless big American coupés from the fifties, sixties and seventies. The typically American phenomenon of the four-door convertible is also worth a nostalgia trip. Think: a modern version of the 1961 Lincoln Continental convertible.

The four-door convertible, pillarless coupé, jump seats and most of these other nostalgic automotive features have one thing in common: They were unsafe. They would crumple like a tin can in a modern crash test. As a result, they were quite rightly relegated to the annals of automotive history. But what if the brightest engineering minds in the automotive industry – instead of working on perfume atomizers and massaging seats were working to make new, safe jump-seats or tail fins?

These are not insurmountable engineering problems. In 2020, we could be listening to vinyl, taking photos on instant film and driving four-door convertibles with fins and whitewalls again. There's no question cars are far better overall now than they were, but we have lost some good things along the way.
