ABCCC is a VicRoads authorised Club to participate in the VicRoads Club Permit Scheme (CPS)

The ABCCC has set rules & conditions for operating a motor vehicle [twenty-five (25) years old and older on the CPS, for further information about how the CPS is conducted by the All British Classics Car Club please visit the club's Website Link ABCCC Club Permit Scheme information All the information is available online.

- Initial contact should be made with the club's Vehicle Logbook Club Permit Scheme (VLCPS) Applications Officer, currently Wally Thompson. He will advise the procedure for application with respect to the conditions set by the ABCCC. He must also provide a first inspection of the vehicle.
- 2. PERMIT RENEWALS VicRoads requires that an ABCCC authorised VLCPS Officer's signature is entered on the permit renewal notice. Therefore, your VLCPS renewal should be sent to Colin Brown, PO Box 40, Coldstream, Victoria 3770. Enclose with it a stamped envelope addressed to VicRoads, along with a cheque/money order for the VLCPS fee. Colin will sign on behalf of the ABCCC, and then forward the permit renewal on to VicRoads. The form also requires YOUR signature, so be sure to sign it as the permit holder as well.

Both Wally & Colin's position are entirely voluntary, so due consideration should be given when contacting them.





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On Sunday we were off early to Murtoa see the heritage site The Stick Shed, photo below is what The Stick Shed looks like from the outside. Our guided tour commenced here, with the wind blowing and it was cold.



Once we got inside, it was a completely different atmosphere. Definitely a WOW for us all. The enormity was overwhelming.

The Stick Shed covers 16,000m2 under roof and measures 265 metres long, 60 metres wide and almost 20 metres high at the highest point..











The Stick Shed was a grain storage facility, that was built over 4 months in 1941 & filled with grain within six months of construction. During that time there was a steel shortage which meant the shed was built from available timber, unmilled mountain ash poles were erected into footings in the ground & concrete was manually poured around the footings.. It received bulk deliveries of grain by train, the grain was distributed through an elevator and a central conveyor running high along the centre of the shed.

The shed became surplus to the wheat industry's needs in 1989 and was emptied for the last time in 1990.



After The Stick Shed, we had free time to explore more of this area.

Some went back to Horsham for lunch, others went onto Rupanyup, to look at the chainsaw art, the silos and the Woods Museum. There were a couple of ways back home either the way we had travelled in the morning, Kevin & Jenny Watt took the pleasant drive back through Mirranatwa Gap.

Here are some photos taken at the Woods Museum. Lifetime collection by two brothers Michael and late John Woods from Rupanyup, who started a collection as a hobby, collecting

pieces from their grandparent's farm. They have memorabilia dating back to the 1920s. Inside the large shed they have completed rooms displaying a grocery store, a butcher and hospital setting of the past.











During Covid, Michael built replicas of his grandparents and his parents homes inside the sheds. When Michael announced he was adding an extension, Bev Langley donated her clothing collection. Bev & her husband, Neil, were foundation members of the Lake Goldsmith Steam Preservation Association in the late 1950s, in attempt to get more women involved she came up with the idea to hold an old-world fashion parade at the rally. She ran this successfully for many, many years. Now the clothes are safe and secure in this museum and make a great women's viewing addition. There was so much more to see in the other sheds, we need to go back.

Monday morning, we had a lovely brekkie with Hamilton and District Veteran, Vintage, Classic Driver's at their Club rooms. Thanks to Lorraine Wilson for organising this and her many club helpers, it was terrific and a reminder of their rally days. The car club made this a social event for their members too, it was great to catch up with some familiar faces and meet some of their members. There was a bit of a club display and our members cars joined in.

WHAT IS AN ASA?.....Photo below of the ASA and details about the car on the next page.







WHAT IS AN ASA?

At his 1959 annual press gathering, Enzo Ferrari announced to the surprised journalists that he had designed and built a four-cylinder 850cc engine developing 68bhp at 7000 rpm. The motor was to be for a road car and not for racing. Within a year a prototype "Baby Ferrari" was seen running around the streets near the Ferrari works. It was based on a Fiat 1200 chassis with a Pininfarina body like a small Lancia Flaminia painted dark blue.

The reasons for building a small car were never fully explained. Work continued with variations to the engine until 1961 when an attractive Bertone Coupe entitled "Coachwork Study for a car of Medium Cylinder Capacity" appeared at the Turin Motor Show. Although badged as a "Mille", it was well known that this was the second prototype of a new small car which some considered to be the entry level Ferrari. The surprising news was that it would not be built by Ferrari, and although most of the components were pure Ferrari he hoped to sell the production rights to a manufacturer who would build the cars at the rate of 60 per week. By now the capacity was up to 1032cc producing 100bhp at 7000 rpm and the car was sitting on a proper Ferrari oval tube chassis. with independent front suspension, and a live rear axle located by parallel arms and a transverse Watts linkage like a scaled down 250 GTO. Rack and pinion steering, four wheel disc brakes, electric overdrive on third and fourth gears, Koni shock absorbers, Borrani centre-lock wheels, a Nardi steering wheel, and a magnificent set of Jaeger Gauges completed the specification.

A buyer was finally found but production delays were constant and it was late in 1961 when the first cars were actually delivered. Whilst the specification and the performance made the ASA such an amazing small car, it also lead to the downfall as the price was almost twice that of an E-Type Jaguar. The company struggled for three years and quietly faded into bankruptcy producing only approximately 120 cars in total.. a far cry from Enzo's dream of 60 cars per week.

There are probably less than fifteen ASAs still in running condition throughout the world today. This car was found in Spain in 1995. It was imported into Australia and is owned by Ean McDowell of Newport.

A little about the collection......

Lane 88 Auto Museum is a small private collection of vehicles owned by John "JD" and Margaret Dymond, the collection has been accumulated over many years and was initially inspired by JD's own mechanical interest and love of classic cars and historic motor racing.

At the eager age of 16, John joined Vauxhall Motors in Luton UK serving a 7-year apprenticeship ultimately becoming a skilled draughtsman, specialising in the design of Vauxhall gearboxes. During his time at Vauxhall, John also obtained a Mechanical Engineering Degree at night school to better familiarise himself on the inner workings of things


While working at Vauxhall JD met a young lady riding a vespa scooter, Margaret also lived locally and had several family members working at the Vauxhall plant. The couple shared a love for motoring and weekend getaways later relocating to Melbourne in March 1958, where JD took up a position with BP Australia, in the Technical Department.



Upon arrival in Australia and purchasing the odd toy car and bike he could tinker on, JD was involved in the launch of the BP long-life fuel range and numerous car rallies and events across the country. Later he would leave BP to take on a role at an additive supplier company.

In 1979, JD's passions of classic cars and mechanical improvement would collide when he and Margaret took the opportunity to the purchase Penrite Oil Company. John's 20 years' experience in, not only the oil industry, but also the additive market gave him the background and knowledge he needed to take up the challenge of his own company along with the nine children he and Margaret would welcome into their

lives.



During the years the Dymond family grew the Penrite business into the market leader it is today, often the kids spending weekends selling oil at the track or helping JD and Margaret at various product club talks or car club more often than not dragging JD away from an old car bookstores.

JD and Margaret bought many cars over the years but always had a soft spot for Vauxhalls and European touring cars, as such the collection features cars from Mercedes Benz, BMW, Bugatti, Riley alongside several historic racing cars. Though we are lucky to have several short-term loaned vehicles to compliment the collection

Although JD is no longer with us, Margaret and the family still enjoy and actively participate in motoring events across Australia and NZ.

JD's wishes that "old cars need to be driven" is a directive of the museum and you will often see these vehicles gracing the open roads, appearing at car show or on track. A future calendar event!




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

Tony's very British Mark V project

Jaguar Mark V Restoration Project

Where do you begin on a trailer load of car parts dismantled over thirty years ago? I thought the logical place would be the Starter Motor where else would you start? I resurrected my parts washer, cleaned all the accumulated grime and then dismantled it, turned the commutator replaced the bushes and brushes and a return spring from my stock of spares(Lea-Francis has the same starter) Reassembled tested and painted and stowed away.

Next while I was in a electrical mood I did the same with the Generator. With a couple of hours to spare on a rainy day I cleaned the rough cast aluminium rocker cover and set about polishing it to a mirror finish, four hours later I was satisfied it would be the crowning glory on top of the engine. I have since done the same to the manifolds and when I finish rebuilding and polishing the twin SU carburettors, under the bonnet should look stunning.

The original engine came completely dismantled and I have measured the bores and crankshaft and apart from a small ridge and surface rust it should recondition well.

Unfortunately, the cast iron block is a two man lift and far too big for my equipment so it is going to a motor engineer who has assisted me in the past. If all else fails it came with a spare engine.

Unfortunately, little progress will be made in the next couple of weeks with a heavy workload in the garden and I am waiting for another trailer load of parts.



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PETER HIBBERT'S 1949 RILEY 2½ LITRE SALOON

After owning a variety of Series 'M' Morris Minors starting from a lo-lite 10 HP 1948 Convertible stepping up to an 850 cc, and beyond to buying and restoring another 4 Morris Minors (but not a Morris Minor 1000 cc), together with a Humber Vouge restoration, I was bitten with the 'English' car bug.

I suppose working for an English based company, Ruston & Hornsby, from 1956 to 1970 at Clayton and being surrounded by English Diesel engines, associated machinery and personnel, a certain passion developed. The directors then drove Jaguar Mk 10's and a variety of 3.8 litre Jaguars year models.

I bought locally a very nice original 1949 Riley $2\frac{1}{2}$ litre Saloon in 1980 with cream body and black vinyl roof livery. The interior was all leather in Vintage Red.

It was not in need of a restoration although it was discovered a partial restoration had recently been performed. I did a few minor items both inside and out to improve to my standard including overhauling the SU type fuel pump and carburettors (2). Balancing the carburettors is tricky but it then ran better.

Other features being vinyl roof covering to wire and timber laths, stock hot water Smiths heater, cassette player and radio (speakers concealed) and wind out driver's front windscreen. Powerful on road but needing strong arms to steer, even on Avon cross ply tyres. The overall ride quality was excellent. The Riley was awarded 5th place at a Riley club concourse in 1987.



Around the same time, I obtained a 1958 Aston Martin DB2-4 Mk III/4 Coupe. There will be a historic story in a later ABCCC newsletter.

As other restoration challenges loomed for me, I listed the Riley for sale at a Shannon's Auction June 20th 1988. It was sold for the reserve price & set a precedence of Riley sales in the future. It sold with I/D plate 'RILEY'.

I joined the Early Ford V8 Club of Victoria in 1986 that catered for flat head side valve V8 models spanning 1932-1954. In that year I bought a 1948 Mercury 4 door Sedan from Queensland and commenced a full restoration of this huge car. The ease of the work convinced me to retain an interest in simple designed practical Fords and Mercurys that eventually led me to restoring many different year models, some sold and now I have 7 that fill my garages. No more English!
