Ensure that you know the sender before opening an email

There's a good chance that it is spam.

Spammers can control other people's accounts, meaning you may get emails from your "friends" who have been hacked. Check you know the sender first, not just the name but the whole email address.

When the sender's address has a bunch of numbers or a domain that you don't recognise (the part after the "@") then the email is likely to be spam.

Check the subject line for common spam topics. You likely already know most of these -- sales, investment opportunities, new treatments, requests for money, sex, information on packages you never ordered, etc. Usually, you are being offered something, often for nothing. If you didn't order it, don't assume you forgot. This is simply a scam tactic to make you click a bad link.

Avoid any "calls to action" or requests for personal information. This is known as phishing, when a criminal pretends to be a reputable site, like PayPal, that has to "update user information," or needs you to sign in "immediately." In general, if the email asks for immediate action or personal information, it is phishing and should be ignored.

• One of the most common subject lines, "Problem with your Account" is almost always phishing. If you had a problem, it will tell you when you log on to the account.

Hover over any links in the email to see if they match their supposed destination. left corner of your different URL shows up. Spammers do this trick all the time to bring you to dangerous sites.

• Be especially wary if the address is a set of numbers -- most reputable companies will use words instead of numerals.

Look for typos, especially of key phrases or words. Check for typos in the header, introduction, and body of the text. Spam normally contains extensive, large images that occupy most of the message body. The text is usually large to capture your attention.

Never open or download attachments unless you know what they are. If you don't know the sender, can't trust a link, or otherwise feel like an email may be spam, do not open any attachments. This is the quickest way to a virus, bar none. If you must open the attachments, right click on them first, then select "scan for viruses" or "scan" before opening.

Delete the email. When in doubt you should just delete the email -- better safe than sorry.

• Delete any and all attachments that you may have downloaded with the email.

CLUB PERMIT SCHEME

ABCCC is a VicRoads authorised Club to participate in the VicRoads Club Permit Scheme (CPS)

The ABCCC has set rules & conditions for operating a motor vehicle [twenty-five (25) years old and older on the CPS, for further information about how the CPS is conducted by the All British Classics Car Club please visit the club's Website Link <u>ABCCC Club Permit Scheme information</u> All the information is available online.

- 1. **Initial contact** should be made with the club's Vehicle Logbook Club Permit Scheme (VLCPS) Applications Officer, currently Wally Thompson. He will advise the procedure for application with respect to the conditions set by the ABCCC. He must also provide a first inspection of the vehicle.
- 2. **PERMIT RENEWALS** VicRoads requires that an ABCCC authorised VLCPS Officer's signature is entered on the permit renewal notice. Therefore, your VLCPS renewal should be sent to Colin Brown, PO Box 40, Coldstream, Victoria 3770. Enclose with it a stamped envelope addressed to VicRoads, along with a cheque/money order for the VLCPS fee. Colin will sign on behalf of the ABCCC, and then forward the permit renewal on to VicRoads. The form also requires YOUR signature, so be sure to sign it as the permit holder as well.

Both Wally & Colin's position are entirely voluntary, so due consideration should be given when contacting them.

The Queen's Horsebox

Now the term 'Horsebox' is commonly used in the UK but in Aust the more familiar term is Horse Float, but in either case it means a vehicle in which equines are transported.

Aeons ago I worked as a tech sales rep for a company that supplied just about everything needed to build whatever type of truck body anybody wanted. I had a good customer located near to the famous town of Melton Mowbray in Leicestershire. The town was and still is most famous for the making of pork pies however the area was also noted as the home of the Quorn Hunt; established in 1696 it was the most prestigious and famous foxhunt in the country - really quite posh, you had to be somebody to hunt with the Quorn. These were the days before the 'sport' was banned, when the high and mighty would gather in packs of riders

and hounds to roar across the countryside including all the farmland in pursuit of a fleeing fox. Fence jumping was part of the fun. All damage to crops was compensated for of course - no point in upsetting the peasants.

Well my motor body building customer located in the area had many clients who were members of 'The Quorn', they bought his horseboxes to transport their 'hunters'. One client of note was Lady Agatha, a prominent member of the local landed gentry. She was a woman of large stature and generous physical proportions. She also possessed a personality to match her appearance and would brook no interference to her intentions. She was formidable, she was fearsome. It was the opinion of the locals that if she had been around at the time and had led the charge of the light brigade the battle would have had a different outcome. She was in fact the person who had given the nickname of 'Sar Major' (SM)to my client because he wouldn't take any of her bullying.

Well this lady was having a new box built by my client and one day whilst he was out somewhere she arrived at the factory and waltzed in to inspect progress. The male staff were terrified of her and almost to a man scattered

and hid as they saw her enter. The few slow movers were cornered and stood in fear as she inspected the construction. She particularly took umbrage as she examined the side door of the box and as the Sar Major appeared she roared, "Will you look at the size of that door man - how is anybody supposed to be able to get through there?" "Well it's the normal size your ladyship" pleaded one of the men.

Sar Major summed up the situation and told her "Aggie you've had six kids, your arse is too big". She looked at him, threw back her head and roared with laughter. "Well I suppose I can turn sideways to get in". Then off she went still laughing.

But this story is about the Queen's purchase, not Lady Agatha's so back to the beginning. Sar Major told me the story of how one day a very imposing, impeccably dressed man rode into the factory yard. He was mounted on a huge black stallion. "Gawd" S.M. related to me "talk about flared nostrils - you could have stuck a pint pot up 'em". He was of course referring to the stallion! The impressive visitor introduced himself as the Queen's equerry and in a very refined voice told that he was there to discuss the purchase of a new horsebox for his employer.

Suitably impressed S.M took the visitor into his cluttered office, cleared the top of the desk and started taking notes. He advised the gentleman of all the latest ideas as regards designs such as the recent introduction of positioning the horses diagonally across the truck rather than at right angles as had previously been done. The visitor just shook his head and replied that the old methods were fine and acceptable. He then requested that the builder source a truck cab/chassis from the supplier for them and said that they preferred a Bedford model. Sar Major was perplexed as Bedford was a pretty downmarket marque usually bought by local councils and commercial buyers. Wouldn't the Royals be better with something more upmarket he asked to which the eqerry replied "The Queen doesn't have to keep up with the Jones' ".

After the visitor had departed S.M. started to organise things. He contacted the local Bedford truck dealer and asked about supply. When he told the dealer who the customer was there was a silence and the dealer told him he

Now this came as a shock, the fact that they would interrupt a production line to make a one off was unbelievable. It would normally require a large number order before they would oblige in this way but given who the client was they would produce what was required.

Now this little event planted a seed in S.M.'s mind. If such a large organisation would jump hurdles and bend rules then what would smaller firms do to 'oblige'? So being the wheeler and dealer he was he made sure that every supplier knew that he was building to a special order and when he wanted anything, just anything he dropped the hint when he ordered that the item was for 'a special job'. He traded on this advantage to get special treatment for long after the new horsebox was being driven around to events by members of the royal household.

NEWS FROM THE FEDERATION. Report On The Federation Delegates Meeting – 11th February 2023.

Report provided by Bill Allen

The above Meeting was held at and hosted by the Little River Mechanics Institute and Free Library and was held in their hall located at 8 Rothwell Road, Little River. Our Club was represented by Delegates Tony Pettigrew and Bill Allen.

The Meeting opened at 1.00pm by Federation President, Neil Athorn, who welcomed Delegates and visitors and thanked our hosts for providing an excellent lunch and the bottles of water and Icy Poles, which were welcomed by all on such a hot day.

Neil then introduced Les Sanderson who is the Secretary/Treasurer of the Little River Mechanics Institute & Free Library Inc. Les advised he has held this position for twelve years. He stated that the facility was started in 1908 and the present hall was built in 1910. Mechanics Institutes are owned and run by the Community who are responsible for everything required to look after the whole facility. Governments, Local Councils and similar entities have absolutely nothing to do with the buildings and the land on which they sit. This hall, which cost £400.0.0 to build, still contains the smallest library in Australia and is not a Memorial Hall but purely a Community facility. Whilst there were large numbers of similar facilities in the past only about 130 survive today, the oldest and possibly the most famous in Victoria is the Atheneum in Collins Street, Melbourne.

This facility is run by a Community Trust, which was established on the 8th August 1910 and is responsible for financing everything necessary to maintain it. It does not receive any grants from any governments or other similar entities.

Les advised that they are responsible for all government safety and similar requirements and in the time he has held his position \$80,000 to \$85,000 has been spent on its maintenance etc - Insurance alone this year has cost \$8,000.00! A lot to insure a one hundred plus year old wooden building.

Les was delighted to see the hall utilised and thanked everyone for their attendance.

Neil thanked Les for his welcome and presented him with a cheque for \$1,000.00 on behalf of the Federation, covering the \$750.00 for lunch plus a donation of \$250.00.

Neil then reported that long time Federation supporter, Len Parnell, had passed away recently and offered his condolences to his widow Lorraine, who was present, on behalf of the Federation and Delegates.

Whilst there were no new Clubs there were several new Delegates who introduced themselves.

Neil then introduced Guest Speaker, Geoff Gwilym, CEO of the VACC, and asked him to give all present an update of any matters of interest that may effect our Movement. Some of the observations made by Geoff :-

He doubted that annual roadworthy tests would be introduced as governments had no appetite for them - no votes in them.

"Old" cars had an insignificant effect on overall emissions as they are a very small percentage of the total number of cars and they generally are used rather sparingly.

Older cars are favoured by a particular group as they are able to work on them and do repairs etc. This is not possible with modern cars with computers etc.

It is very difficult to compare European countries with Australia for many reasons, such as distances. It takes around thirty years for any major change, such as changing completely to electric vehicles, to take effect.

Hydrogen powered vehicles likely to restricted to large trucks and farm vehicles in the foreseeable future.

The battery industry is a very dirty industry and there are still many problems to be overcome regarding recycling. Neil thanked Geoff for his informative talk on behalf of Delegates.

There was then a discussion on Zoom Meetings, it appeared that a number of Delegates were not in favour of them.

The Hamilton Club requested a Trophy for their Welcome Back Tour, to be held on the King's Birthday Weekend, 9th - 12th June 2023. It was agreed that a Trophy would be supplied for this Event.

Delegate, Doug Palmer then gave a detailed resume of the program and invited Delegates to report back to their Clubs to advise their Members to attend. It is the first Tour after a three year break.

Treasurer Brett advised since the last Meeting when the account balance was \$12,603.64, it has now been reduced to \$6,716.67. He also advised that Invoices for Subscriptions were available for Delegates to collect.

He stressed the need to keep Club Committee details up to date and write the information clearly as there are currently ten Clubs that are not financial and he has found impossible to contact them.

Neil spoke about upcoming Events and spoke about the 26th March 2023 when several Events were being organised to raise money for Peter Mac. and encouraged Clubs to support these Events.

Neil then spoke about the Bendigo Swap, which is to held on the 11th-12th November 2023. He stated that the organisation was progressing satisfactorily and that there were only six outside sites and ten inside sites available.

Whilst they have looked at alternative sites it was considered the present site, the Prince of Wales Showgrounds was the best site. The Swap has a six year contract with the Showgrounds and he wants six weeks' notice at least if the Swap is to be cancelled. The Federation has lost around \$40,000.0.0 in the last two years due to cancellations. He is currently endeavoring to arrange a Meeting with the Showgrounds Committee and local government Members, one of whom is Jacinta Allan, the Deputy Premier. As the Showgrounds will be hosting some Events during the Commonwealth Games in 2026 it is not clear what impact this will have on the Swap at this stage. Flyers will be available shortly.

David Berner, President of the AHMF (Australian Historic Motoring Federation) advised that Western Australia has rejoined and a new Magazine, Spoke 'n' Hub Torque, will be issued six times a year. Issue one having been issued already. David advised they were still trying to obtain firm information about our fleet, which are our Mobile Heritage. They were looking to introduce the AOMC's Greenfleet initiative on a National basis but were uncertain at this stage not knowing what may be introduced by Governments in the future. They are also trying to ascertain the true size of our movement as nobody really knows at this stage.

Neil spoke about the Federation's North West Tour, to be held from 27th August to 1st September 2023, stating Application Forms are now available. The RACV is sponsoring the Tour, donating \$5,000 - their maximum amount these days. They will, however, not be supplying any Road Patrols for the Tour.

Secretary, Rebecca Dempsey, gave a demonstration of the Federation's new Website which she has heavily involved with. It is a great improvement on the previous one, which was, quite frankly, terrible. One can obtain all necessary information from the Federation at the touch of a button. The Website is :- www.federation.asn.au - well done Rebecca.

Neil said the Federation had a good Meeting recently with the AOMC. Some of the subjects discussed were what constitutes a Club, debate on Club Members number plates, future of CPS Log Books, the time they need to be kept and if online logbooks are likely to be introduced in the future and inconsistencies encountered from VicRoads staff.

VicRoads have apparently decided that they own all number plates, which makes it rather unclear regarding the actual ownership of early enamel plates that in many cases people have paid huge sums, especially lower numbers. Currently a Member of the Early Ford V8 Club is having difficulties with VicRoads. The Federation is endeavouring to assist in this matter. There appears to be a lot of uncertainty with VicRoads at the moment.

The Early Ford V8 Club recently won the Club Magazine of the Year Award - well done to the Editor and Members. Congratulations were extended to the Club by all present.

Their Delegate Max acknowledged the congratulations and advised that they were currently experiencing some difficulty with their insurance company, Marsh Insurance, regarding Show and Shines and Swap Meetings and were having trouble getting any response from them. The Federation will follow up.

Nothing further from the ATO regarding Taxation.

The Kerang Club are holding a Show and Sign the weekend before Easter.

The National Motoring Heritage Day will be held on 22nd May 2023, many Clubs are organising events.

A 1950 Convertible Austin A40 Devon owned by a local member won the prize for the best car on site. The owner said he bought the car about three years ago and had done some work on it.





