# **CLUB PERMIT SCHEME**

ABCCC is a VicRoads authorised Club to participate in the VicRoads Club Permit Scheme (CPS)

The ABCCC has set rules & conditions for operating a motor vehicle [twenty-five (25) years old and older on the CPS, for further information about how the CPS is conducted by the All British Classics Car Club please visit the club's Website Link <u>ABCCC Club Permit Scheme information</u> All the information is available online.

- 1. **Initial contact** should be made with the club's Vehicle Logbook Club Permit Scheme (VLCPS) Applications Officer, currently Wally Thompson. He will advise the procedure for application with respect to the conditions set by the ABCCC. He must also provide a first inspection of the vehicle.
- 2. **PERMIT RENEWALS** VicRoads requires that an ABCCC authorised VLCPS Officer's signature is entered on the permit renewal notice. Therefore, your VLCPS renewal should be sent to Colin Brown, PO Box 40, Coldstream, Victoria 3770. Enclose with it a stamped envelope addressed to VicRoads, along with a cheque/money order for the VLCPS fee. Colin will sign on behalf of the ABCCC, and then forward the permit renewal on to VicRoads. The form also requires YOUR signature, so be sure to sign it as the permit holder as well.

Both Wally & Colin's position are entirely voluntary, so due consideration should be given when contacting them.

# **Digital Driver Licences On the Way For Victorian Motorists**

08 May 2023

The Andrews Labor Government will give motorists the option to carry their licence on their phone with a digital driver licence trial in Ballarat before a statewide roll-out by 2024.

The new technology will give motorists the choice to store a secure digital version of their driver licence in the popular Service Victoria app or soon-to-be-launched my VicRoads app.

From June, full licence holders in Ballarat will be able to sign up for the pilot through the Service Victoria or VicRoads websites before the trial begins in July, with those who register progressively invited to add a digital version of their licence to their phone.

Following extensive work by the Labor Government, the card will feature superior security features – with the licence updated in real time in response to any changes such as new licence conditions or a change of address.

Digital licences will automatically reveal if a licence has been revoked or suspended but will still be available for use to prove identity or age when it is not active.

The licence has a highly secure, timed QR code that can be scanned by licence validators such as police, businesses and other authorities to verify authenticity and prevent fraudulent use.

Accessibility and security of personal information is the highest priority. During the Ballarat trial, feedback will be sought from motorists, retailers, licensed venues, Victoria Police and places where a licence is used as proof of identity.

The initial pilot is for full licence holders and won't change the obligation for L and P plate drivers to carry their physical licence with them at all times. Drivers will still have the option to use their physical licence.



In anticipation of a statewide roll-out, the Government will also begin engagement with key business and industry leaders to make sure Victorian workers and businesses are well prepared.

# **History of Grain Corp in St James**

The Grain Corp Silos at St James has a history dating back as far as the 1915-16 wheat season when 135,000 bags (405,000 bushels) was recorded as being delivered to the railway station. A record that was only exceeded once in the 1962-63 season when 421,439 bushels was delivered. This was an amazing achievement as transport was mostly by horse and wagon at the time.

More history followed when in December 1943 the St James Silo received its first bulk load. Two extensions were made also, one in 1955, a steel annexe and then in 1967 another steel bin was added. The St James silos were eventually decommissioned.



In 1882 George Coles Snr married his wife Elizabeth and purchased his first store at the North Eastern St James. He soon opened a second store four miles away in Lake Rowan. They traded mainly farming equipment.

Elizabeth and George's first son was born in 1885 and following tradition, they named him George James. George and Elizabeth would have 10 children and all would attend school in St James. Tragically Elizabeth died in 1900 and in 1902 George sold his two stores and moved to Geelong.

But in 1905 George returned again and re-purchased the North Eastern St James and Lake Rowan stores. George James Jnr (GJ) helped his father in the store but left as he wanted to pursue new methods of shopkeeping. A year later with George's health fading, he sold the St James store to his son GJ Coles.

In 1913 GJ Coles sold his St James Store and went for a trip around the world to discover the best ways to run a business. In England he studied the Woolworths 3d and 6d stores and Marks and Spencers 1d stores.

Together with his brother Jim they opened their first 3d, 6d and 1 shilling store in Australia at 288 Smith Street, Collingwood. Sadly, Jim was killed in the first world war along with GJ's other brother Dave. GJ himself was wounded in France.

Upon his return GJ opened another store with another brother AW Coles at 172 Smith Street, Collingwood. From there the business grew from 100 pounds in 1914 to 1,132 million dollars in 1972.

GJ Coles never forgot where he came from and returned many times to St James to visit family and friends.

The company Coles also made a generous donation towards the St James Silo Art Project.

Thanks to Sharon for the 18 jars of homemade jam and the car magazines Lance provided for club member taking. Feedback is the jam is delish.



# **Operating Heritage Australia**

# How much carbon does your vehicle emit?

There is a lot of discussion about global warming, greenhouse gases and the need to reduce carbon dioxide. There will be increasing pressure to reduce fossil fuel (hydrocarbon) usage as this is a major producer of carbon dioxide (CO2).

If we are to preserve Australia's cultural heritage in operating condition and continue the social and economic benefits that flow from this, we will need to eliminate or offset our carbon emissions.

Operating Heritage Australia supports a three-step approach to minimising carbon emissions from historic machinery:

- 1. minimise the use of fossil fuels in all aspects of daily life
- 2. use renewable fuels where appropriate.
- 3. where no alternative is available, offset emissions by supporting projects that consume more carbon dioxide than we produce.

We need your support to inform decision-makers and the general public that our contribution to climate change is tiny and that we are working to eliminate, through renewable fuels or offsets even that tiny amount.

First, start by understanding the size of the problem – how much carbon dioxide does your historic vehicle actually emit each year?

Find where your vehicle's fuel consumption intersects with its km/year to find CO2 in kg.

For example, on average, Australian historic cars (based on the latest FIVA survey) travel around 1200 km/yr and if we assume a 14L/100km (20mpg) fuel consumption, then the amount of carbon dioxide produced is 504kg for the year.

As a comparison:

- A human breathes out around 240kg CO2 per year
- A medium-sized dog produces (breathing and food) 700-800kg CO2 per year
- A typical electric car driving 10,000 km per year and charged from the grid produces around 1150kg

In 2023 the majority of historic motor vehicles could have their total carbon emissions offset through ethical revegetation schemes for under \$20 per year.

### Some other information:

The total amount of petroleum fuels used each year by the 500,000 owners of historic vehicles accounts for around 0.05% of Australia's total petroleum-based fuel consumption. There is no viable alternative available at this time.

The average electric vehicle will produce less carbon per kilometre than an internal combustion vehicle – around half that of a modern vehicle and around a quarter that of an historic vehicle (and less if charged by solar or wind).

Any new vehicle (electric or internal combustion) will produce carbon dioxide during its construction (materials, assembly and transport). According to the International Energy Agency, manufacturing a mid-sized internal combustion vehicle will produce around 6t CO2 and a similar electric vehicle around 8-10t depending on the type and size of battery. This means that it if you replace your historic vehicle with any new vehicle, it could take around 20 years before you have saved the carbon used to manufacture the new vehicle.

OHA will try to keep you up-to-date in this rapidly changing area of alternative energy sources for motor vehicles. If you have any questions, please contact your local association or AHMF.

# NEWS FROM THE FEDERATION.

#### REPORT ON THE FEDERATION DELEGATES MEETING - 6th MAY 2023.

The above Meeting was held at the excellent Club Rooms of the Veteran Vintage & Classic Club Bendigo Inc. at 112 - 118 Inglis Street West Bendigo and hosted by the Club. Our Club was represented by Delegates Tony Pettigrew and Bill Allen.

The Meeting opened at 1.00pm by Federation President, Neil Athorn, who welcomed Delegates and Visitors and thanked our hosts for providing such a fine meal for our lunch.



As both the President and Vice President were not present at the Meeting, Neil - a Member of the Club - gave a brief history of the Club. The Club was formed in 1969 and currently has a membership of around 180 with many different makes of cars. In 1984 the Club bought the land where the current Club Rooms are situated. They purchased a tandem trailer, built three sheds, dug a pit, purchased a sand blaster etc. The buildings were extended gradually to what they are today. A hoist was installed 18 months ago. Two of the sheds are utilised by the Federation and the other for the trailer. The Club organises three runs a month and are looking forward to the Swap Meeting. Neil then introduced several Committee Members who were present at the Meeting.

Minutes of the previous Meeting were approved and there was one new Delegate present from Wangaratta. The Federation has been talking to VicRoads re length of time old Log Books need to be kept, not yet resolved. Another Meeting is scheduled for later this month. No Delegates present had any further problems with their Insurance.

Neil then advised that there were letters to all Member Clubs for Delegates to collect seeking Volunteers for the Bendigo Swap. Clubs will receive \$10.00 per Member for each hour each Volunteer works. No tickets this year, wristbands, which will be provided to Volunteers in October.

Treasurer, Brett Holloway, gave his Report. Of the ten Clubs that were not financial last Meeting five had paid their dues with five yet to pay. At the end of the previous Meeting the Balance of the working account was \$6,716.67. At this Meeting, after monies received have been added and accounts paid out, the balance is \$8,089.53.

No update has been received from the ATO re proposed Taxation, next update from them is scheduled for this August. The proposed scheme cannot start before 1st July 2023 and no report will be due before 30th June 2024.

There were two requests for Grants.

- The first, for \$750.00, was from the West Enders Club, a chapter of the Gippsland Club, who wish to purchase a computer to document a large quantity of records prepared by a now deceased long time Secretary.
- The second, for \$500.00, from the Dandenong Valley Club, who wish to purchase a teardrop banner to advertise their Club at Events etc.

Both proposals were moved and approved.

Neil then spoke about the Mortlake Picnic and the rather low attendance. He does not want overlays with any other events and it is too expensive to run if only a few attend. Hopefully the next one will attract a greater attendance.

The resent Wunghnu Event had the best attendance ever, with over 100 tractors on display! There is now a small team established to run the next one, tentatively 30/31st March 2024.

Max Hobson, Delegate for Dandenong Valley Club and Early Ford V8 Club advised that the Scoresby Picnic had a slow start but around 250 cars eventually came. There was a great variety of vehicles in attendance and plenty of catering available. Max said the Steam Park in Scoresby was an ideal venue for the Event. Event likely to be held next year on the 24th March 2024, to be confirmed. Marong and Castlemaine Events are confirmed for 26th & 27th August 2023 whilst the Baw Baw Event likely be held in the last week of October this year, to be confirmed.

The Peter Mac tins that were given out at the last Meeting are slowly being returned. Some Clubs are still having runs and to date around \$2,000.00 has been received. There are still some returned tins yet to be opened and it is intended to arrange the tins again next year. The Trafalgar Holden Museum still has a tin and two tins held \$1,000.00.

The Bendigo Swap is on again this year and is to be held on the 11th and 12th November 2023 and there are flyers available for Delegates to take back and distribute to their Clubs. Neil had met with the local Government Member for Bendigo - Deputy Premier Jacinta Allan - who would not give a guarantee that the Swap would not have to be cancelled once again should an emergency, like last year's floods, should arise. Sudden cancellations cannot be ruled out. There are still flood effected people from Rochester staying at Elmore.

Neil is investigating the possibility of obtaining a grant for cancelled Swaps, nothing to report as yet. Also no satisfactory alternative site has been found yet, if required. He is still to have further Meetings.

Jacinta Allan also advised that as some of the Commonwealth Games are to be held at the Showgrounds a large shed is to be erected shortly which will necessitate some stallholders will need to be relocated. There has been no response from some stallholders, it seems all outdoor sites have been booked out. A few indoor sites are still available in the "New" Shed. Insurance is still to be finalised, Barn Finds have been found for their display and two new computers have been purchase for recording details of sites and volunteers. The older computers have been retained to act as backup.

President of the AHMF, David Berner, advised that their third Newsletter is yet to be sent out. He requested that any interesting articles be sent to Neil as soon as possible as it is intended to send the Newsletter letter out very soon. It is proposed to issue four Newsletters each year. Operating Heritage Australia have produced a sheet, including a graph, which indicates that a medium sized dog produces more CO2 per year than an historic car travelling 1,200 kms per year, plus a number of other statistics. David encouraged Clubs to publish this sheet in their Newsletters - with acknowledgement to Operating Heritage Australia. The more exposure this type of information gets regarding the old car movement the better, especially to Governments, as currently not enough is occurring. The Bendigo Swap alone brings in around \$4,000,000 each year to be area.

The proposed Open Tour that the Federation is currently organising, leaving the Marong Picnic on the 27th August, travelling to Kerang, Swan Hill, Echuca, finishing at Shepparton on the 1st September has so far attracted 20 paid up entrants and 50 expressions of interest. It is hoped more people will show interest. Entry Forms are available today.

The Federation Website is going along ok. More information will be uploaded shortly. Any articles can be sent to Rebecca Dempsey who will include them on the Website.

When cars and other items, such as signs, are stolen and the AHMF are advised they will put the information on their Facebook page to gain wider exposure and, hopefully, the return of the items.

Following an enquiry regarding repairers of pressure gauges [Garage Works in Geelong - phone 5277 9296 was suggested] David Berner advised the AHMF was currently preparing a list of all sorts of suppliers and repairers which will be included on their Website in due course.

The Federation, together with the AOMC, are scheduled to have another meeting with VicRoads on the 17th May regarding the Club Permit Scheme and the ownership of number plates - the latter is yet to be resolved - and it hoped to arrange at least quarterly Meetings with them in the future. Both the Federation and the AOMC do not wish to be involved with the running of the Club Permit Scheme, best handled by VicRoads. Nothing is currently coming from our VicRoads contact John Lewis at the moment. Brett spoke about the problems the Federation has in attending Meetings with VicRoads, because of the tyranny of distance it is necessary to leave home very early, getting home quite late and possibly needing to have a day off work. Both the Federation and the AOMC are looking to have at least some of the Meetings with VicRoads as Zoom/Virtual ones. Also Delegates please advise any matters they wish to have raised with VicRoads. The terminology between the terms Heritage and Historic were also raised and discussed. It was noted that when a vehicle is to go full registration it is necessary to present it and appropriate paperwork to VicRoads, whilst to go on the Club Permit Scheme it is only necessary to present the paperwork and not the vehicle. This was thought to be an anomaly which could possibly allow inappropriate vehicles to be placed on the Scheme. Club officers need to be vigilant in this regard. Overall the scheme seems to be working well. There was much discussion on the whys and wherefores of and with the Scheme. A lot depended on the education of staff in VicRoads to get things correct as currently different answers can be received from different staff on the same matter.

It was noted the importance of Incorporated Clubs to send their Annual Return to Corporate Affairs Victoria and to pay the necessary annual fee. This led to a discussion on what constitutes a Meeting. The effects on younger members of the population were discussed noting that whilst many may not wish to attend Meetings personally they may be more willing to participate in Virtual/Zoom meetings.

Graham Ralph of the Hamilton Club spoke about their upcoming Welcome Back Tour, to be held over the King's Birthday Weekend in June and advised he had Entry Forms available today.

There was some discussion regarding the Yellow Austin Healey Sprite in the car park. After sitting idle in a garage for 60 odd years it was restored by a young man with the help of his grandfather. He was the beneficiary of a Shannon's Trust grant, which helped him a lot. Well done Brody!

There was some discussion on the AOMC's Offset Scheme and non polluting E Fuel. It is not clear what the Government is currently looking for in regards to Offsets. Perhaps Delegates could join Lobby Groups to ascertain what the Government really wants. Currently this is not clear.

One Delegate advised his Club was charged an extra \$5.00 for their Post Office Box as the Club was considered a business!




