The ABCCC has set rules & conditions for operating a motor vehicle [twenty-five (25) years old and older on the CPS, for further information about how the CPS is conducted by the All British Classics Car Club please visit the club's Website Link ABCCC Club Permit Scheme information All the information is available online.

- 1. **Initial contact** should be made with the club's Vehicle Logbook Club Permit Scheme (VLCPS) Applications Officer, currently Wally Thompson. He will advise the procedure for application with respect to the conditions set by the ABCCC. He must also provide a first inspection of the vehicle.
- 2. **PERMIT RENEWALS** VicRoads requires that an ABCCC authorised VLCPS Officer's signature is entered on the permit renewal notice. Therefore, your VLCPS renewal should be sent to Colin Brown, PO Box 40, Coldstream, Victoria 3770. Enclose with it a stamped envelope addressed to VicRoads, along with a cheque/money order for the VLCPS fee. Colin will sign on behalf of the ABCCC, and then forward the permit renewal on to VicRoads. The form also requires YOUR signature, so be sure to sign it as the permit holder as well.

Both Wally & Colin's position are entirely voluntary, so due consideration should be given when contacting them.

All cars have pedals. Every driver knows that and once they learn to drive they promptly forget about them. But they are important, very important. There are either two or three in the vast majority of autos, even the new 'sparkies' (electric models) have them. For this little exercise we are only interested in the two right hand side ones. If the third pedal is present it doesn't come into play in the following dissertation.



Now of important note here is that every time you push down with your foot onto one of the mostly rubber coated devices it's costing you money and the harder you push the more money you're parting with. There are environmental concerns at play as well especially if you are green inclined. If that's of importance to you well again the more often you push and the more vigorous the application the more you pollute. See you don't have to spend millions on a new 'Sparkie' to help save the world, just modify your actions.

The car will proceed if you don't have a foot on a pedal – uh! That's what is called 'coasting' or 'free wheeling'. Note the term 'free' because although it is not completely free travel, it is as near as you can get in this world. In days of old some cars had a control on the dashboard actually marked 'free wheel'. I once travelled in I think, a 1948 model Rover so equipped. By turning this knob you engaged or disengaged this facility; a modern car we have just acquired has this feature but it works automatically – no fancy knob these days – all done with electronics now.

The two pedals we are talking about are the accelerator (the 'go' pedal) and the brake (the 'wo' pedal). If whilst moving along you take your tootsies off both and just concentrate on the steering you will still proceed albeit at a slowing pace. Now if you put thought into this ability you can save the planet (a bit) but more importantly you can save cash – why?

All the time you are pushing the go pedal you are pumping fuel into the engine and the harder you push the more you pump. You may have noticed that especially of late this fuel stuff doesn't come cheap so it's worth thinking about all this, unless you're super rich of course.

Same thing applies when you push the 'wo' pedal. In this case your pushing makes some wearing items like brake pads or linings start to 'wear' by pushing them onto items made from steel, a substance that doesn't wear, at least not very much anyway. This activity on your part causes friction that effectively slows down the car. The energy displaced goes into heat – don't put your hand onto the inner wheel area of your car if you've driven and stopped a lot, it might hurt!

These 'wearing bits', often called 'sacrificial elements' by engineers - get the idea - they 'sacrifice' themselves to achieve a result - a lot like mothers do, with kids. Again the harder you push the more the wear occurs so the nearer you get to receiving a bill for the repair work to replace them; again if you're mega rich go read another article.

Now how do you get to win out with this 'free wheeling'? Well if you do what a lot of folks do and drive always with a foot on either pedal so that you push the 'go' right up until the instant you push the 'wo' pedal then you're a loser. If you're a thinker and a winner then look ahead of the car, way ahead, and look what's going on a distance ahead. If you see a round about, a red light or a build up of traffic then lift your size nine off the 'go' and rest it on the floor as the car still runs ahead but slows getting ready to handle the coming obstruction. Be alert of course and be ready to apply the 'wo' if something unexpected happens.

Now there's a side effect to saving dosh and saving the planet (a bit). If you put mental effort into planning ahead with your car control it keeps your mind on the driving and away from the myriad of other worries in your life. Tell a lie here and swear that you never let your mind wander as you drive and sometimes can't remember how you got to where you are right now. I'll tell a truth and admit that when I was working and was trying to make the world a better place (that's maybe a little exaggeration but I'm writing this so lets call it poetic license) I would often drive half way to work with no recollection of the journey.

Now if you believe the boys and girls in blue its speed that kills. I reckon that it's inattention; if it is speed then why is there not mayhem on the German autobahns. I've been in the Fatherland and driven at over 180 kph – its exhilarating to drive at very high speeds and believe me your mind is so alert you notice everything.

The other thing is, that it's fun to see how accurate you can become at judging distances and seeing how your ability improves over time. You don't get bored, frustrated or agro when you are using your skill to smooth the way. Aeons ago when I lived in NSW and travelled very often to visit a business friend in ACT – a boring drive before the advent of motorways the friend who also did the same journey and I had a competition to ease the boredom. We competed by noting the moment we passed the Liverpool highway sign and the moment we entered ACT at the border. The competition needed sportsmanlike honesty (that

did exist in those far off days) to declare how few times you touched the brake pedal over the journey. To take part in the game you had to be on full alert all the time. It was amazing how successful you could become.

Drive safe, save money and maybe the planet (a bit).

Ombudsman finds Victoria's electric and plug-in hybrid vehicle charges administered unfairly Date posted:27 Sep 2023

Today Victorian Ombudsman Deborah Glass tabled her *Investigation into the Department of Transport and Planning's implementation of the zero and low emission vehicle charge*. The report details a range of failures in the State Government's implementation of the road-user charge for electric and plug-in hybrid electric vehicles (ZLEVs) under the *Zero and Low Emission Vehicles Act 2021 (Vic)*.

The Ombudsman received more than 30 complaints about the application of the ZLEV Act. These complaints concerned two main issues – whether the charges were unreasonably applied, considering how owners used their vehicles, and whether additional charges imposed after submitting a late odometer declaration were wrong.

One driver of a plug-in electric hybrid, a vehicle that can use either fuel or electric power, reported travelling thousands of kilometres in remote parts of Australia using fuel, as there were no charging stations. Despite the driver paying fuel excise on those kilometres, the Department did not waive the additional hundreds of dollars payable under the ZLEV charge.

"We found an unreasonable lack of policy guidance to those administering the legislation, inflexible handling of complaints, and an unwillingness to exercise discretion. It is also wrong to charge penalties not provided for in legislation, and the money collected under this 'penalty' should be repaid." Ms Glass said.

Drivers must generally provide photographic evidence of kilometres travelled at the start and end of each registration period. One case in the report highlighted the unfairness faced by a driver who was late providing the required photo of their vehicle's odometer because they were overseas. Instead of responding flexibly, the Department cancelled her registration.

If an odometer declaration becomes overdue, the Department estimated a charge based on the 'average travel' of Victorian vehicles. This occurred even where people told the Department this estimate exceeded the distance the ZLEV had travelled in its lifetime, as a 'penalty' charge.

In five complaints made to the Ombudsman, the Department initially refused to amend invoices where the estimated kilometres exceeded the total distance the vehicle had travelled, describing it as a 'penalty' for lateness. There is no provision in the ZLEV Act for the Department to impose a penalty charge.

"As the Robodebt inquiry showed us, there are dangers in making assumptions and using average calculations to charge people. Assumptions have been made about how people will use their electric vehicles, which plainly disadvantage people with older vehicles or those who have less access to charging stations.

"And while this report focuses on the actions of the Department of Transport and Planning, there are broader lessons for the public sector about the dangers of making policy on the run (or not making it at all), and the importance of exercising discretion." Ms Glass said.

Background

In July 2021, the new road-user charge for ZLEVs was introduced in Victoria under the Zero and Low Emission Vehicle Distance-based Charge Act 2021 (Vic) ('ZLEV Act'). This legislation was the first of its kind in Australia. Its validity is currently being challenged in the High Court.

This investigation does not touch on the validity of the legislation, which is a matter for the High Court. Nor does it consider whether it is good public policy to impose a charge on electric vehicles.

The Victorian Government's rationale for introducing the charge was that ZLEV owners pay little or nothing towards the maintenance of Victorian roads. Owners of traditional fuel-powered vehicles pay for public road upkeep through the Commonwealth fuel excise

ZLEVs are grouped into two categories – battery electric vehicles ('BEVs') and Plug-in Hybrid Electric Vehicles ('PHEVs').

- 1. BEVs include vehicles that use only electric power from a battery and vehicles that use a hydrogen fuel cell.
- 2. PHEVs have two independent engines: a PHEV can operate as an entirely electric vehicle or an entirely fuel-propelled vehicle. PHEVs can travel varied distances using electric power, from around 40 to 80 km per charge.

Hybrid vehicles, which have a fuel motor that is simultaneously assisted by an electric motor, are not considered to be ZLEVs and owners of hybrid vehicles are not charged under the ZLEV Act.

By the numbers

- 19,200 ZLEVs registered in Victoria
- Over 180 complaints made to the Department
- 67% of these were about unsatisfactory process or policy
- Over 240 ZLEV registrations cancelled
